FY2025 CoC Program NOFO Overview

CoC Program Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO)

- The CoC Program NOFO Competition is facilitated by HUD and occurs annually, inviting CoCs from across the nation to apply for competitive funding.
- Each Fiscal Year (FY) Competition process begins with Registration of the CoC by the CoC Collaborative Applicant, followed by the review of the CoC's Grant Inventory Worksheets (GIW) and the release of the CoC Program NOFO.
- The Office of Care Coordination, as the Collaborative Applicant for the Orange County CoC, facilitates the local competition process and completes the Consolidated Application that is submitted to HUD, consisting of:
 - ❖ Final Project Priority Listing with the ranking and tiering of new and renewal projects
 - ❖ CoC Application, which includes responses to multiple narrative and data-related questions
- **Lead entities involved:**
 - ❖ County of Orange – Collaborative Applicant to coordinate and complete Consolidated Application
 - ❖ CoC NOFO Ad Hoc (NOFO Ad Hoc) – Develop NOFO policies and processes, including Scoring and Rating criteria, review and evaluate the CoC Renewal Project Applications
 - ❖ CoC Board – Review and approve CoC NOFO policies and processes, including Scoring and Rating criteria and Ranking and Tiering policy; approve final Project Priority Listing, as recommended by the NOFO Ad Hoc

- HUD released the FY CoC Competition and YHDP Grants NOFO on Thursday, November 13, 2025.

FY2025 CoC Program NOFO Overview

FY 2025 CoC and YHDP NOFO: HUD's Goals and Objectives

- 1. Ending the crisis of homelessness on our streets.** Citing a California Policy Lab study from 2019, HUD claims that 75% of people experiencing unsheltered homelessness report a substance use disorder (SUD) and 78% report a mental health condition. Therefore, CoCs should direct resources towards outreach, intervention, and assistance consistent with Executive Order on “Ending Crime and Disorder on America’s Streets.”
- 2. Prioritizing Treatment and Recovery.** CoCs should prioritize projects that provide treatment and services needed to recover and regain self-sufficiency, including on-site treatment and participation requirements in services.
- 3. Advancing Public Safety.** CoCs should cooperate with law enforcement to advance public safety. HUD cited the Supreme Court decision in *Grants Pass v. Johnson* as upholding the authority of local governments to prohibit public camping.

FY2025 CoC Program NOFO Overview

FY 2025 CoC and YHDP NOFO: HUD's Goals and Objectives

4. **Promoting Self-Sufficiency.** Highlighting that one of the primary purposes of the COC program is to optimize self-sufficiency, HUD indicates that CoCs should prioritize projects that help lead to long-term economic independence for individuals and families. This would allow them to exit homelessness and prevent future returns to homelessness.
5. **Improving outcomes.** CoCs should review all eligible projects to determine their effectiveness in reducing homelessness and prioritize those that promote self-sufficiency, increase employment income over government assistance, and promote treatment and recovery.
6. **Minimizing trauma.** CoCs should encourage the use of trauma informed care, ensure safety of program participants, and access to 'safe, single-sex spaces' for women.

- CoC Bonus Funding Available to the Orange County CoC: **\$6,649,715**
- Eligible CoC Bonus project types:
 - ❖ Supportive Services Only (SSO) Standalone
 - ❖ Supportive Services Only (SSO) Street Outreach
 - ❖ Transitional Housing (TH)
- The RFP will be utilized to identify new projects and/or expansion projects for the CoC Bonus available through the FY2025 CoC Program NOFO funding and any additional reallocation funds that become available.
- All proposed services must be new, and proposed project funding cannot replace other existing funding sources.

Eligible Project types and Populations to be served

Reallocation Funding Overview

- The Orange County CoC may have additional funding available for new projects through the reallocation process as the CoC NOFO local competition continues, as the review and evaluation of renewal projects is still underway. As such, the total funding available for reallocation has not yet been confirmed.
- However, given HUD's new priority to fund TH and SSO projects, no more than 30 percent of a CoC's ARD will be allowed to fund Permanent Housing Projects, including Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH), Rapid Re-housing (RRH) and Joint Transitional Housing and Permanent Housing/Rapid Re-housing (Joint TH-PH/RRH) projects.
- As such, an estimated \$21 million that currently funds Permanent Housing projects will be reallocated. Reallocation funds will be prioritized for current CoC-Funded agencies who voluntarily select to reallocate their Renewal Projects, in part or in whole, during the FY2025 CoC Program competition. CoC-Funded agencies will be prioritized for reallocation funds through this RFP consistent with the amount of funds voluntarily reallocated in support of meeting the 30 percent cap of Permanent Housing.

CoC Bonus and Reallocation Funding: Eligible Populations to be Served

- Eligible households to be served with CoC Bonus and/or Reallocation funding:
 - ❖ CoC Bonus: Persons who qualify as homeless under paragraphs (1), (2), or (4) of 24 CFR 578.3 or Section 103(b) of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act coming directly from the streets or emergency shelters and include persons fleeing domestic violence situations and other people meeting the criteria of paragraph (4) of the HUD definition of homeless.

- DV Bonus Funding Available to the Orange County CoC: **\$3,060,976**
- Eligible DV Bonus project types:
 - ❖ Transitional Housing (TH) Projects
- Eligible households to be served with DV Bonus funding:
 - ❖ Survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking that are defined as homeless (24 CFR 578.3).
 - ❖ Per the FY2025 CoC Program NOFO, new projects proposed and funded through the DV Bonus cannot exclusively serve people fleeing or attempting to flee human trafficking but may serve this segment of the population as part of the total population to be served.

Eligible Project types and Populations to be served

Domestic Violence (DV) Bonus Funding Overview and Priorities

- Eligible households to be served with DV Bonus funding (cont.):
 - ❖ For purposes of the CoC Program and other HUD programs authorized by the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, section 605 of Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) 2022 amended section 103(b) of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act to require HUD to consider as homeless: any individual or family who—
 - is experiencing trauma or a lack of safety related to, or fleeing or attempting to flee, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or other dangerous, traumatic, or life-threatening conditions related to the violence against the individual or a family member in the individual's or family's current housing situation, including where the health and safety of children are jeopardized;
 - has no other safe residence; and
 - lacks the resources to obtain other safe permanent housing.
