Project Roomkey

- The County of Orange continues to operate temporary isolation shelters for individuals and families experiencing homelessness who are COVID-19 sick or symptomatic
- Total capacity to serve is 150 persons
- Referrals into the program are made by the Public Health Services, hospitals, shelters, street outreach teams, and law enforcement

Project Homekey

- Project Homekey began operations on November 23, 2020 and has been operated by Jamboree Housing Corporation and American Family Housing in partnership with the Office of Care Coordination.
- The target population for Project Homekey includes adults 65 and older and/or vulnerable individuals and two-person households transitioning out of project RoomKey and Project Tool belt
- Project Homekey offers a total of 128 units: 70 units at Stanton location and 58 units at Tahiti Motel location
- Referrals to Project Homekey will end on November 30, 2021.

Current project outcomes:

- **Total served:** 210
- **Exits to Permanent Housing:** 51
- **Participants Currently Matched to Housing:** 73
- **Average Length of Stay:** 171 days

CoC Board Nomination and Election Process

- The CoC Board approved the recommendation for inclusion of two (2) additional At-Large member seats and specific expertise/experience for nine (9) At-Large member seats at the September 20, 2021, CoC Board meeting. This increases the total membership of the CoC Board to include 17 seats.
- All board seats will be for a two-year term, with no limit on how many times a person can serve on the board.
- The CoC Board looks to provide a well-balanced perspective from multiple sectors to best lead the response to homelessness in Orange County.
- Some board seats require a certain background as set forth by HUD and the Orange County CoC Governance Charter.

Through the CoC Board Seat Nomination and Selection process, the Orange County CoC is looking to identify nine (9) candidates to fill the following CoC Board seats:

- One (1) seat for McKinney-Vento Representative

- One (1) seat for Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Entitlement Jurisdiction or Funded Agency/ Recipient Agency
- Six (6) seats for At-Large representation
 - One (1) seat for affordable housing development background and expertise
 - Three (3) seats for expertise on homeless services and/or subpopulation focus
 - Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC)
 - People with disabilities
 - Diversion
 - Prevention
 - Families
 - Rapid Rehousing
 - LGBTQ
 - Transitional Aged Youth
 - Two (2) seats do not have a prescribed priority area of expertise/experience.

HUD Equal Access Rule Assessment Tool

- The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Equal Access Rule Assessment Tool has been updated and re-released.
- This tool provides specific action steps for HUD recipients and subrecipients to meet the requirements of the Equal Access Rule in shelters and other facility settings.
- The tool covers:
 - Requirements regarding the creation of policies and procedures
 - The responsibility to train staff and contractors
 - Communication to residents about their rights and protections
- Three action steps are provided based on the assessment responses and the most critical steps necessary for creating inclusive and safe access. The provider can retake the assessment for new priority steps at any time.

- **Assessment:** Replace the VI-SPDAT with data collected in the program entry screen - Length of Homelessness
- **Prioritization:** Primary and sole factor will be length of homelessness; Discontinue the shelter preference; Discontinue VI-SPDAT

Brown Act Update and Determination

Background

- The **Ralph M. Brown Act** requires that most deliberations and actions of public boards, committees, and commissions (“BCCs”) be conducted and taken openly. Prior to the COVID-19 emergency, this required meetings of BCCs to be held in person, with teleconferencing by a member allowed only under limited circumstances.
- On **June 11, 2021**, the Governor issued Executive Order N-08-21, waiving certain provisions of the Brown Act and authorizing BCCs to hold public meetings virtually. The Executive Order specified that those waivers remain valid through September 30, 2021.
- On **September 16, 2021**, the Governor signed into law Assembly Bill 361 (AB 361), amending the Brown Act to allow BCCs to continue virtual meetings until January 1, 2024, but with less flexibility than afforded by the Executive Order. AB 361 adds a new subsection (e) to Government Code Section 54953, laying out the requirements for such meetings.

Business Calendar – Item #3

Background

- **AB 361** notes that virtual meetings must take place during a proclaimed state of emergency where State or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or during a proclaimed state of emergency where the BCC determines by majority vote that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.
- If the BCC determines that holding virtual meetings is in the best interest, it shall make the following findings **every 30 days thereafter**:
 1. Review and reconsider the circumstances of the state of emergency.
 2. Find that the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person. [or] State or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing.

Business Calendar – Item #3

Analysis

- The Orange County CoC has been conducting the Board and Committee meetings in accordance with the waivers as authorized in Executive Order N-908-21. With the waivers coming to an end and in accordance with subsection (e) to Government Code Section 54953, the Orange County CoC will be considering the circumstances of the recommended action to continue teleconferenced meeting for the next 30 days.
- Continued teleconference meetings for the next 30 days will support the Orange County CoC in continuing to meet to further the goals of the CoC and ensure continuity of CoC activities. Additionally, it will provide the CoC membership and the Collaborative Applicant ample time to plan for the transition to in-person meetings and implementation of COVID-19 safety protocols.

Recommended Action

- Determination in accordance with AB 361 Section 3(e)(3) that, while the state of emergency due to the COVID-19 pandemic, as originally proclaimed by the Governor on March 4, 2020, remains active and/or state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, the Orange County CoC Board has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency and has determined that the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person and/or state or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing.

- On September 15, 2021, the Orange County Housing Finance Trust (OCHFT) adopted Bylaws (reference Item VII. Attachment A) detailing the creation of an Advisory Board.
- The Bylaws detail that one of the seven members of the Advisory Board will be a member who also serves on the Orange County CoC Board.


Background

BACKGROUND

Friendship Shelter, as the lead entity in the South Orange County Collaborative, has been facilitating collaborative case conferencing for seniors experiencing chronic homelessness based on South SPA By-Name-List data from HMIS since December 2020. We are now requesting comparable de-identified data from North and Central SPAs to analyze the effectiveness of the Collaborative Case Conferencing model using a comparative research method.



DEFINITIONS

By-Name-List

A close-to-real-time, passively collected list of everyone experiencing homelessness in a region that can be utilized democratically through interagency efforts to make the transition from “my clients” to “our clients.”

Collaborative Case Conferencing

A targeted, action-oriented, and housing-focused problem-solving method rooted in the assumption that a coordinated and regional approach to resolving housing crises for individuals experiencing homelessness produces effective and efficient results.

Targeted

Selecting a single population on which to focus efforts to demonstrate the possibilities of the model.

Housing-Focused

The sole intent of the intervention is to end participants' experience of homelessness.


Action-Oriented

An action is assigned for each participant on the By-Name-List each week, and a system of transparency and accountability is in place to follow up on assigned actions.

System Barriers Perspective

Barriers are localized in the system instead of participants. For instance, instead of phrasing a participant's mental health problem as a barrier, we phrase the barrier as a lack of accessible housing for people with mental health problems.


INITIAL OUTCOMES

Over the period for which Collaborative Case Conferencing has been provided, there have been 21 housing outcomes recorded for 63 unique participants. The target population of seniors experiencing chronic homelessness has also decreased by 25% from 40 people to 30 people. Though these outcomes appear favorable, true understanding of the effectiveness of the Collaborative Case Conferencing intervention given the data at hand can only come through comparative research.

We intend to compare the population that received the Collaborative Case Conferencing Intervention against those that did not to determine if there is a statistically significant increase in housing outcomes associated with the intervention. Findings will be compiled into a manuscript in the hopes of seeking publication in academic journals, as well as be used to inform the process of rolling out similar programs in Central and North SPAs.

2022 Point In Time

Why do a Point In Time Count?

- The Point In Time count is mandated by HUD on odd-numbered years for every Continuum of Care (CoC) in the country.
- Orange County Community Resources partners with the CoC to conduct Point In Time count.
- The count obtains an unduplicated number of homeless people in Orange County at a specific “point in time”.
- HUD exempted CoCs (including Orange County) from a January 2021 count because of COVID. To encourage a 2022 count (not mandated) HUD awards 3 bonus points to CoCs who participate.



Benefits of the Point In Time Count

- Provides the public an opportunity to get involved and learn about homelessness and the available resources and services
- Opportunity to reconcile and update the Veteran Registry and bring us one step closer to ending veteran homelessness
- Opportunity to count families experiencing homelessness and connect them to needed resources
- Opportunity count transitional age youth experiencing homelessness and connect them to needed resources



What is Involved?

- Street-based enumeration will include homeless encampments, streets, sidewalks, parks, vacant lots, business centers, neighborhoods, alleys, etc.
- Service-based access centers, such as food and clothing programs, social service agencies, and medical facilities, etc.
- Housing Inventory enumeration will include shelters, transitional housing and other residential programs.
- Subpopulation specific efforts
 - Transitional Age Youth
 - Veterans
 - Families



Who is Involved?

- **County of Orange** – Health Care Agency, Social Services Agency, OC Community Resources, OC Sheriff's Department, OC Parks, and OC Public Works
- **City Net** – lead agency for unsheltered count
- **2-1-1 Orange County** – lead agency for sheltered count
- **Covenant House California** – lead for transitional age youth count
- **Hub for Urban Initiatives** – Methodology/HUD compliance
- Orange County CoC, nonprofit providers, faith-based providers, community-based organizations, cities, law enforcement

- To be consistent with the 2019 Point In Time, taking into account the COVID-19 pandemic:
 - Survey-based count
 - ArcGIS technology for mapping
 - Survey 123 – phone app for data collection
 - Unique identifiers to minimize duplications and allow count over multiple-days
 - Teams of volunteers trained/deployed to maps to conduct surveys





Dispatching Street Count Teams
