Orange County CoC Program Award for FY2022

- On August 1, 2022, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) issued the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for the FY 2022 CoC NOFO Competition.
- On March 28, 2023, HUD announced an award of \$31,453,663 to Orange County's CoC Program for FY2022.
 - 24 renewal projects
 - 2 bonus projects
- This represents a \$663,758 increase in CoC Program funding for Orange County. The new funding represents an increase in the CoC Planning grant, as well as the award of a new Coordinated Entry System (CES) Domestic Violence (DV) Bonus Project in the amount of \$250,000 to the County of Orange as the CES lead agency and a new Rapid Rehousing Bonus Project in the amount of \$362,421 to Friendship Shelter, Inc.

FY 2023 CoC Program Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO)

- The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) releases the CoC Program NOFO annually, which invites CoC's from across the nation to apply for competitive funding.
- It is anticipated that the FY 2023 CoC Program NOFO will be released in Spring of 2023, which is earlier than previous years.
- The Office of Care Coordination and CoC Board are preparing for the upcoming FY 2023 Program NOFO and will provide ongoing communication via the CoC email distribution list as updates arise.

 - Orange County Housing Authority (OCHA)
 - Anaheim Housing Authority (AHA)
 - Santa Ana Housing Authority (SAHA)
 - Garden Grove Housing Authority (GGHA)
- Each Housing Authority can “*project-base*” up to 20% of their housing choice vouchers to develop affordable and permanent supportive housing

Background

The four Public Housing Authorities (PHAs) in Orange County apply for and receive Special Purpose Vouchers from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to serve people experiencing homelessness including:

- **Emergency Housing Vouchers**
 - The Emergency Housing Voucher (EHV) program was made possible through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Through EHV, HUD provided 70,000 housing choice vouchers to local PHAs in order to assist individuals and families who are homeless, at-risk of homelessness, and victims of domestic violence.
 - Referrals come through the Coordinated Entry System.
- **Mainstream Vouchers**
 - Mainstream Vouchers (MS5) assist non-elderly persons with disabilities. Aside from serving a special population, Mainstream Vouchers are administered using the same rules as other housing choice vouchers.
 - The 2017, 2018, and 2019 Appropriations Acts provided funding for new Mainstream vouchers. Since 2018, HUD has awarded over \$500 million in funding to PHAs to support 50,000 new Mainstream Vouchers.

Background

- **Veteran Affairs Supportive Housing Vouchers**
 - The HUD-Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) program combines HUD's Housing Choice Voucher rental assistance for homeless Veterans with case management and clinical services provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).
 - Referrals come from the VA Medical Center of Long Beach.

Background

The PHAs in Orange County apply for and receive Special Purpose Vouchers from HUD to serve people experiencing homelessness including:

- **Family Unification Program and Foster Youth to Independence Vouchers**
 - The Family Unification Program (FUP) is a program under which Housing Choice Vouchers are provided to two different populations:
 1. Families for whom the lack of adequate housing is a primary factor in:
 - a. The imminent placement of the family's child or children in out-of-home care, or
 - b. The delay in the discharge of the child or children to the family from out-of-home care.
 2. Eligible youths who have attained at least 18 years and not more than 24 years of age and who have left foster care, or will leave foster care within 90 days, in accordance with a transition plan and is homeless or is at risk of becoming homeless at age 16 or older.
 - PHAs administer the FUP and/or Foster Youth to Independence (FYI) vouchers in partnership with Public Child Welfare Agencies (PCWAs) who are responsible for referring FUP families and youths to the PHA for determination of eligibility for rental assistance.
 - Referrals come from the Orange County Social Services Agency.

New Foster Youth to Independence (FYI) Initiative PIH Notice

- On March 15, 2023, HUD issued [Notice PIH 2023-04: Foster Youth to Independence \(FYI\) Initiative](#). This notice amends Notice PIH 2021-26 and announces the availability of \$30 Million in new Foster Youth to Independence (FYI) funds made available on a noncompetitive, rolling basis.
- The FYI initiative was created in 2019 to invest in local, cross-system collaborative efforts to prevent and end homelessness among youth with a current or prior history of child welfare involvement.
- Under FYI, PHAs provide housing assistance on behalf of youth at least 18 years and not more than 24 years of age who left foster care, or will leave foster care within 90 days, in accordance with a transition plan described in Section 475(5)(H) of the Social Security Act and are homeless or are at risk of becoming homeless at age 16 or older. In addition to providing rental assistance, youth must be provided supportive services to assist the young person on their path to self-sufficiency.

State and Federal Housing Policy Updates

State Updates: Housing Stability and Homelessness

SB 225 (Caballero) Community Anti-Displacement & Preservation Program (CAPP):

Funds the acquisition and preservation of affordable housing units to prevent the displacement of current residents.

SB 567 (Durazo) Homeless Prevention Act of 2023:

Expands protections adopted under the Tenant Protection Act of 2019 to close loopholes in no-fault just cause evictions; increases the population of protected tenants; lower the cap for allowable rent increases; and strengthens accountability and enforcement.

Amendment to California Constitution (ACA 10) (Haney) Fundamental Human Right to

Housing: Places amendment on the ballot stating the fundamental right to adequate housing for all Californians and the shared responsibility of the state and local governments to protect it.

AB 920 (Haney) Housing Status Anti-Discrimination Protection: Adds “housing status” to the list of protected categories under CA anti-discrimination law.

AB 919 (Kalra) Stable Homes Act: Would grant tenants, local public agencies, and mission-driven nonprofits the first opportunity to purchase rental housing properties (right of first refusal) when owners put those properties up for sale, and a right to match an offer on these properties made by a third party.

State Updates: Affordable Housing Production

AB 309 (Lee, Carillo, Kalra) Social Housing and SB 555 (Wahab) Social Housing Act:

Increases state production of social housing (publicly backed, self-sustaining, mixed income housing).

SB 20 (Rubio) Joint Powers Agreement: Regional Housing Trusts: Authorizes 2 or more cities, by entering into a joint powers agreement, to create regional housing trusts to fund housing to assist the unhoused and low income in their jurisdictions.

AB 653 (Reyes) Housing Voucher Utilization Program: Would provide resources to increase voucher utilizations, including housing navigation, landlord incentives, and security deposits.

AB 1657 (Wicks) The Affordable Housing Bond Act of 2024: Places an affordable housing bond on the 2024 ballot.

AB 49 (Soria) Affordable Housing: Would state the intent of the legislature to enact legislation that would increase the supply of affordable housing and reduce homelessness.

ACA 1 (Aguiar-Curry) Lower Voter Threshold for bond and tax approval for affordable housing development: Lowers the necessary voter threshold from a two-thirds supermajority to 55% to approve bonds and taxes for affordable housing and public infrastructure projects.

California Budget Updates

- Projected \$22.5 billion budget shortfall triggering cuts, delays or deferrals of spending previously authorized
- Maintains 2022-2023 budget agreement for affordable housing development for 2023-2024
- Zero new affordable housing funding
- No new funding to replace Prop. 1 bond funds (support the development of affordable multi-family housing) that are expected to be exhausted in spring 2023
- Budget also lacks any new substantial funding to increase targeted funds for rental assistance or permanent housing development

Federal Update: Fair Housing

U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) 2023 Proposed Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing (AFFH) Rule:

- Builds on the 2015 AFFH Rule
- Implements the Fair Housing Act's AFFH mandate by requiring state and local communities—as well as public housing agencies—to identify and address fair housing issues
- Program participants would identify fair housing issues, prioritize the fair housing issues they would focus on overcoming in the next three to five years, and develop the goals they would implement to overcome those fair housing issues
 - Requirements: Program participants would submit to HUD for review and acceptance an Equity Plan every 5 years that is developed following community engagement and contains the fair housing analysis, goals, and strategies.
 - Would require program participants to incorporate fair housing goals from their Equity Plans into subsequent planning documents (e.g., Consolidated Plans, Annual Action Plans, and Public Housing Agency (PHA) Plans).

Federal Updates

U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) announced \$2.8 billion on March 28, 2023, in Continuum of Care (CoC) Competition Award for homeless service and housing providers. Includes:

- \$80 million for non-competitive Youth Homeless Demonstration Program renewal and replacement grants
- \$52 million for new projects that support housing and service needs for survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking

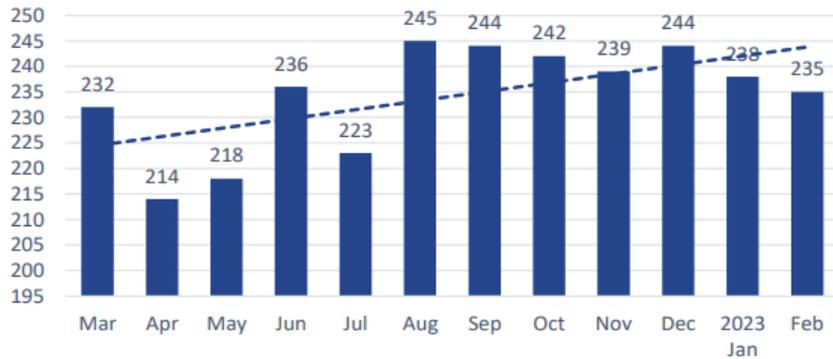

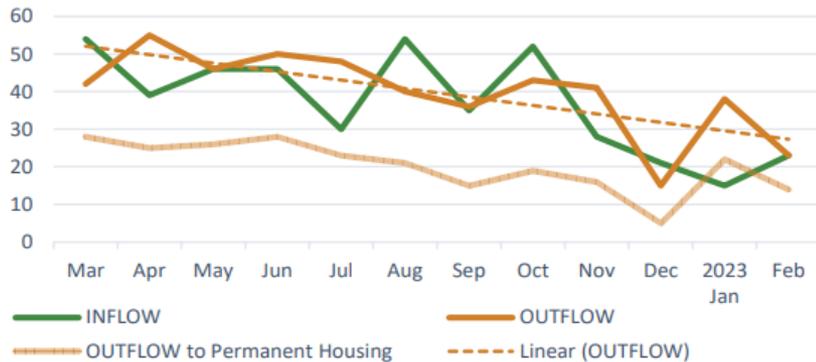

Inflow vs. Outflow by Month



Currently, there are 254 veterans on the Veteran Registry including 235 veterans experiencing homelessness. In the previous 12 months, 242 veterans have been housed in permanent, stable housing. Over 30 agencies, including the VA Community Resource and Referral Center, outreach providers, and shelter providers, continue to meet weekly to coordinate housing and services for veterans experiencing homelessness in Orange County. In the past 12 months, there has been an 1% increase in the number of veterans experiencing homelessness in Orange County.

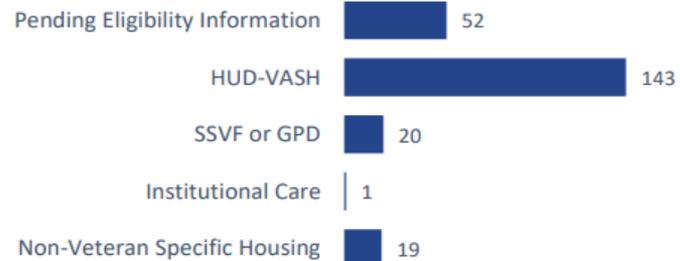

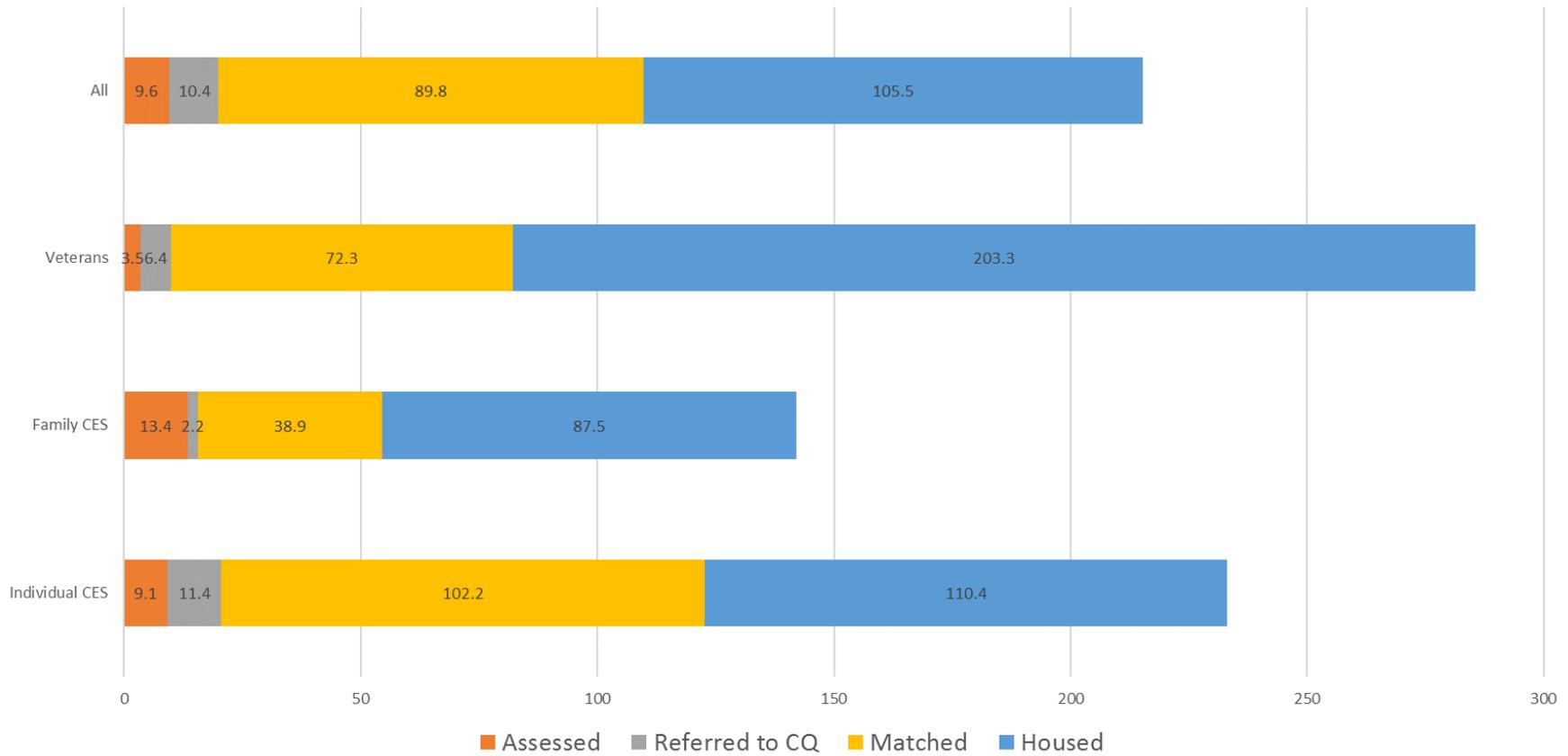

- The goal was to make data-informed system refinements with an equity lens to ensure that people moved quickly through the CES referral process to permanent housing.

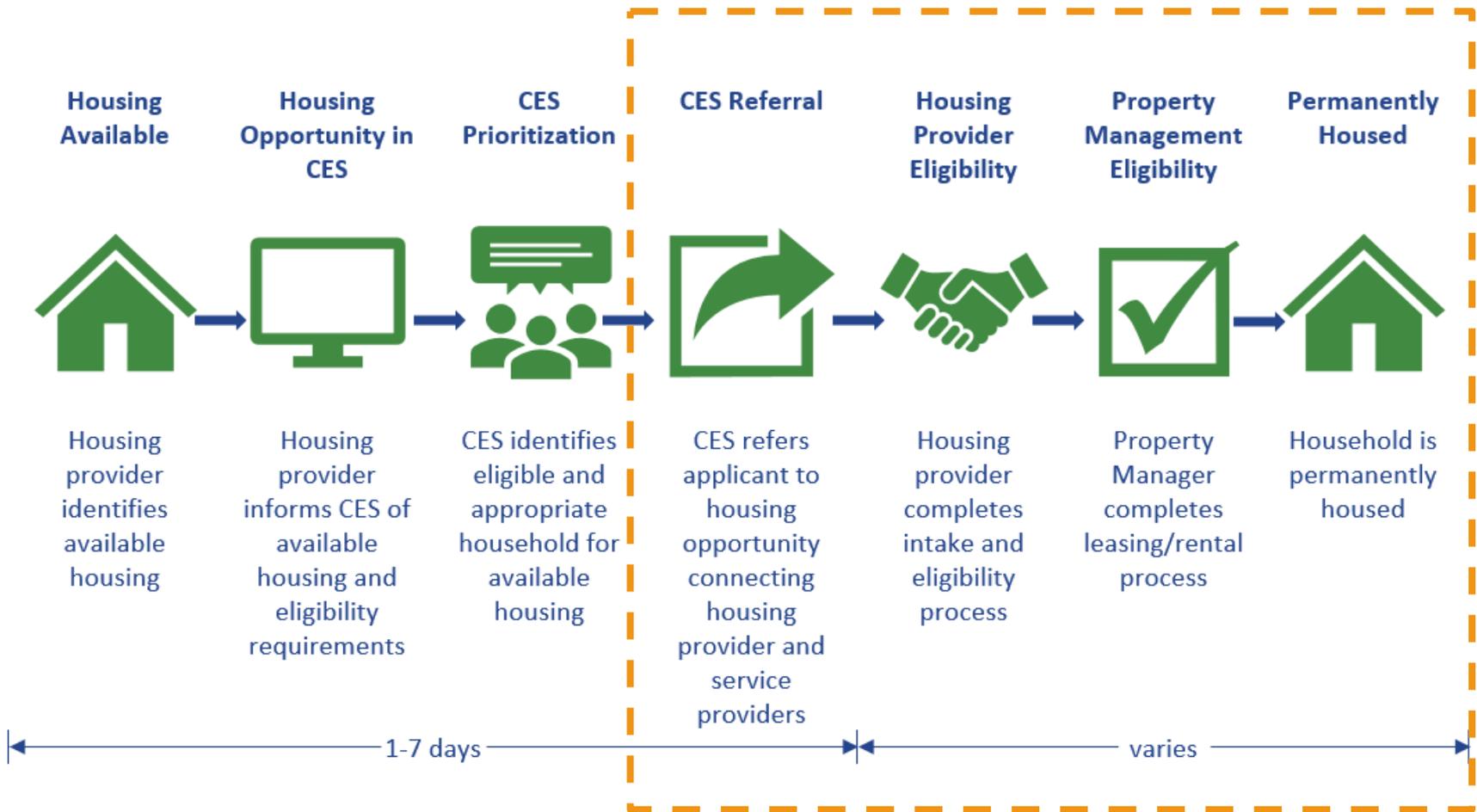

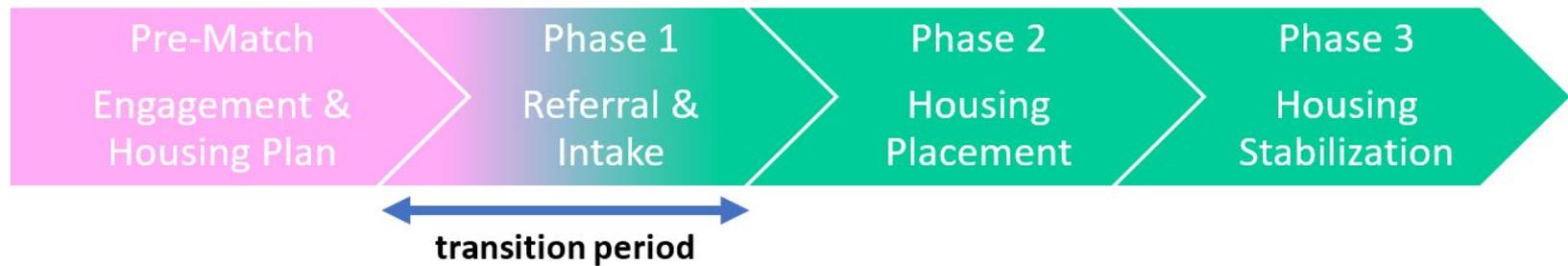


Outcome and Goal
