Business Calendar – Item #1

2018 Family Unification Program (FUP) Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)

- At the July 18, 2018, special meeting of the Continuum of Care (CoC) Board, the CoC Board approved the FUP MOU and Statement of Need with the Orange County Housing Authority (OCHA).
- The purpose of the non-financial MOU was to document the partnership among OCHA, OC Social Services Agency (SSA) and the Orange County CoC.
- The FUP promotes unification by providing Housing Choice Vouchers (HCVs) to the following households with low-income:
 1. **Families** for whom the lack of adequate housing is a primary factor in:
 - a. The imminent placement of the family's child or children in out-of-home care, or
 - b. The delay in the discharge of the child or children to the family from out-of-home care.
 2. **Youth at least 18 years and not more than 24 years of age** (have not reached their 25th birthday) who left foster care, or will leave foster care within 90 days, in accordance with a transition plan described in Section 475(5)(H) of the Social Security Act and are homeless or are at risk of becoming homeless at age 16 or older.

FY 2022 FUP Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO)

- On April 25, 2023, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) released FY 2022 FUP NOFO which makes \$5 million available to provide new FUP vouchers to eligible households
 - Families who are currently involved in the child welfare system and lack adequate housing
 - youth between the ages of 18 to 24 (who have not reached their 25th birthday) who have left foster care, or will leave foster care within 90 days, and are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.
- The FY 2022 FUP NOFO requires an updated MOU with an execution date in calendar year 2023.
- An updated MOU between OCHA, OC SSA and the Orange County CoC is needed for OCHA to submit an application in response to the FY 2022 FUP NOFO.
- Approval of the MOU provide OCHA an opportunity to receive new FUP vouchers to eligible families and youth.

CalOptima Health's HMIS Updated Data Request

- In September 2022, the CoC Board approved a data request to receive recurring monthly data reports of all persons within HMIS to complete member match with CalOptima Health enrollment data.
- In January 2023, an additional request to include full Social Security Number in each monthly HMIS enrollment report was approved by the CoC Board.
- As part of the evolving process to develop strategies and sound methodologies, CalOptima Health's staff engage other Managed Care Plans (MCPs), such as LA Care.
- Through this engagement, new best practices are emerging. It has become more apparent that additional data elements are needed to better identify which members are obtaining housing, remaining housed, exiting back to homelessness, or still experiencing homelessness.

Additional Data Element Requested

- CalOptima Health is returning to the CoC Board to request **“Exit Destination”** be added to the monthly HMIS reports currently received from 2-1-1 Orange County (211OC).
- Specific combinations of HMIS data elements CalOptima Health will use include the following:
 - ❖ **“Project Exit Date”** and **“Exit Destination”** (Note: CalOptima Health does not currently receive the latter)
 - ❖ **“Project Entry Date”** and **“Project Type”**
- The **“Exit Destination”** element will allow staff to identify members who might benefit from additional interventions or services, including CalAIM Community Supports and/or Enhanced Care Management.
- As noted previously, no individual level data is shared publicly.
- Resulting aggregated analyses and/or reports might be shared in the following public venues including, but not limited to: CalOptima Health’s Board of Directors, Advisory Committees, and Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) for Housing and Homelessness Incentive Program (HHIP) reporting requirements.

CoC Vision Ad Hoc

- At the December 15, 2021, meeting of the CoC Board, the CoC Board approved the adoption of the Orange County CoC Leadership Vision for Calendar Year (CY) 2022 – 2024, as developed by the CoC Vision Ad Hoc membership.
- Following the December 15, 2021, meeting, the CoC Vision Ad Hoc and the Office of Care Coordination reconvened to draft objectives under each strategic aim of the vision document, ensuring objectives were specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, time-bound, inclusive, and equitable (SMARTIE)
- At the January 25, 2023, meeting of the CoC Board, with an updated timespan, the CoC Board CY 2023 – 2025 Leadership Vision and Objectives was presented and approved by the CoC Board for adoption.
- The previous CoC Vision Ad Hoc sunset on January 25, 2023, noting that the tasks and activities they were initially tasked with were completed.

- The CoC Board is being asked to appoint Amy Arambulo, Coordinated Entry System (CES) Steering Committee participant and Vice President of Community Impact at 2-1-1 Orange County, and CoC Board members Becks Heyhoe, Dawn Price, Nichole Gideon, Nishtha Mohendra and Tim Shaw, to the CoC Vision Ad Hoc.

CoC Domestic Violence Committee

- The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) continues highlighting the needs of survivors of domestic violence and allocating resources to housing and supportive services for this subpopulation.
- Recognizing the needs to support survivors of domestic violence, the Orange CoC Board has approved the prioritization of multiple projects specifically designed to serving survivors of domestic violence as part of the annual CoC Program Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) released by HUD.
- The following funding has been awarded to the Orange County CoC over the years totaling approximately \$3 million.

CoC Domestic Violence Committee

- As continued funding and resources enter the homeless service system and the Orange County CoC, there is a need to further coordinate efforts to prioritize, serve and house survivors of domestic violence, as well as advance implementation of housing protections of survivors under Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) throughout Orange County.
- The CoC Board membership is being asked to consider establishing a CoC Domestic Violence Committee to focus on ending homelessness for survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and/or stalking, and measuring progress on these efforts.
- In addition, the CoC Board membership is being asked to review and approve the Domestic Violence Governance Charter, which outlines the proposed purpose, responsibilities and membership of the committee.
- The Office of Care Coordination worked closely with Maricela Rios-Faust, as the Domestic Violence Agency representative on the CoC Board, to draft the committee's Governance Charter for the CoC Board's consideration.

Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program (YHDP) NOFO Update

- On April 14, 2023, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) announced the release of the YHDP NOFO for Round 7.
- Approximately \$60 million is available nationally to address systemic responses to youth homelessness and significantly reduce the number of youth experiencing homelessness.
- The Office of Care Coordination is working closely with the Transitional Age Youth (TAY) Collaborative Committee, youth-specific service providers, and local community partners to receive community feedback and complete the application.
- Feedback from service providers and community partners was received through the following sessions and meetings and will assist in drafting a competitive application:
 1. **YHDP Planning Session #1:** May 5, 2023
 2. **YHDP Planning Session #2:** May 12, 2023
 3. **Service Provider Forum Meeting:** May 18, 2023
 4. **YHDP Planning Session #3:** May 19, 2023

Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program (YHDP) NOFO Update

- The Office of Care Coordination is compiling feedback from the planning sessions and Service Provider Forum meeting to support with the drafting of the YHDP NOFO Round 7 Application.
- Additionally, a TAY Ad Hoc comprised of members from the TAY Collaborative Committee is meeting regularly with the Office of Care Coordination to plan for the YHDP NOFO Round 7 Application, which is due on June 27, 2023.

- On March 28, 2023, HUD announced an award of \$31,453,663 to the Orange County CoC Program for FY2022.
 - ❖ **24 renewal projects**
 - ❖ **2 new bonus projects**
- This represents a **\$663,758 increase** in CoC Program funding for Orange County.
- The new funding represented through:
 - ❖ An increase in the CoC Planning grant
 - ❖ Coordinated Entry System (CES) Domestic Violence (DV) Bonus Project in the amount of **\$250,000** to the County of Orange as the CES lead agency
 - ❖ Rapid Rehousing Bonus Project in the amount of **\$362,421** to Friendship Shelter, Inc.

FY2023 CoC NOFO Local Process

- The upcoming Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 CoC Program NOFO is anticipated to be released by the HUD in Spring or early Summer 2023.
- In preparation for the release of the FY2023 CoC Program NOFO, the Office of Care Coordination, with the approval of the CoC Board, has convened the FY2023 CoC NOFO Ad Hoc, which includes membership of CoC Board members and two partners with lived experience who are involved in the Orange County CoC's efforts.
- The FY2023 CoC NOFO Ad Hoc has met four times to review the CoC Program NOFO application process; draft the proposed project performance measures, point allocations, and thresholds; and discuss feedback received from the CoC-funded agencies at the CoC NOFO Renewal Meeting held on May 15, 2023.

FY2023 CoC NOFO Local Process

- The Office of Care Coordination, as the Collaborative Applicant, is planning to release the Agency Administrative Review portion of the CoC Renewal Application to CoC-Funded agencies in early June.

HIC PIT

- **HIC: Housing Inventory Count**

- The Housing Inventory Count (HIC) collects information about all of the beds and units in each Continuum of Care homeless system, categorized by Project Type. Only beds dedicated to serve homeless clients should be counted on the HIC.

- **PIT: Point-in-Time Count**


- The Point In Time Count (PIT) provides a count of sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons. The PIT includes population data (number of households and persons), as well as subpopulation data (number of chronically homeless clients, clients with a mental illness, etc.). The Sheltered Point In Time count is a survey of clients residing in Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing projects on the night of the count.



Bed Utilization *Includes year-round, seasonal, and overflow beds*




2023 Sheltered PIT: Total Clients

Sheltered PIT Count from 2021 to 2023



The Sheltered Point In Time Count increased by 332 persons from 2022 to 2023.




2023 PIT: Clients with Disabilities



Prevalence of Comorbidity Among Persons in Shelter with Disabilities

Funding Opportunities to Serve Youth Experiencing Homelessness or Housing Instability

- In April 2023, the Administration on Child, Youth, and Families' Family - Youth Services Bureau (FYSB) released four NOFOs to support youth and young adults who are experiencing homelessness or housing instability. The four NOFOs are detailed below:
 - ❖ [FY 2023 Basic Center Program \(BCP\) NOFO](#) provides emergency shelter and services for up to 21 days to youth under 18 years of age who have left home due to family conflict or other crisis or are experiencing homelessness. Application due June 20, 2023.
 - ❖ [FY 2023 Street Outreach Program \(SOP\) NOFO](#) provides street outreach services to youth experiencing homelessness or housing instability, who have left home, and are sleeping on the street or are at-risk of sexual abuse, sexual exploitation, and human trafficking. Application due June 20, 2023.
 - ❖ [FY 2023 National Communication System \(NCS\) for Runaway and Homeless Youth Program NOFO](#) provides a dedicated toll-free, U.S. national communication system that provides information, referral services, crisis intervention, prevention approaches, and other supportive services to vulnerable youth, youth who are experiencing or at-risk of experiencing homelessness, and youth who have run away from home, and their families or legal guardians. Application due June 9, 2023.
 - ❖ [FY 2023 Runaway Homeless Youth \(RHY\) Training, Technical Assistance and Capacity Building Center NOFO](#) provides direct training and technical assistance to existing RHY grant recipients and subrecipients to enhance their efforts to successfully implement projects supported by FYSB grant funds. Application due June 20, 2023.
