




#### Homeless Veterans on Veteran Registry




Currently, there are 232 veterans on the Veteran Registry. In the previous 12 months, 205 veterans have been housed in permanent, stable housing. Over 30 agencies, including the VA Community Resource and Referral Center, outreach providers, and shelter providers, continue to meet weekly to coordinate housing and services for veterans experiencing homelessness in Orange County. In the past 12 months, there has been a 1% decrease in the number of veterans experiencing homelesness in Orange County.





#### **CES for Survivors**

- The Office of Care Coordination worked closely with Homebase, a national technical assistance provider in the field of housing and homelessness, to facilitate a DV Survivor Stakeholder ad hoc and listening sessions with survivors to draft CES policies and procedures for DV survivors.
- After a public feedback period and an extensive review process, the CoC Board approved the updated CES Policies and Procedures on December 20, 2023.
- The Office of Care Coordination, as the CES Lead, began the implementation of CES for Survivors on **January 1, 2024**, including providing CES Partner training.
- Survivor Assessments began on February 16, 2024. No Survivor Assessments have been submitted to CES.
- Victim service providers are reporting that housing funds have largely been exhausted for the current program year, so survivor dedicated housing resources are extremely limited.







#### **Virtual Front Door Housing Data**



# **CES Policies and Procedures Update**

- Updated CES Policies and Procedures were approved by the Continuum of Care Board on December 20, 2023.
- CES began implementing the updated CES policies and procedures on January 1, 2024, including the updates below:
  - CES for Survivors
    - Incorporate CES for Survivors into the CES Policies and Procedures, including the key components of CES: access, assessment, prioritization and referral.
  - Assessment Updates
    - Adopt the use of the following CES assessments: Pre-Assessment Screening, Shelter Assessment, Housing Assessment, Survivor Assessment, Stepping Up Assessment, Moving On Assessment and Prevention Assessment.
  - Establish a Disaster Prioritization Policy
    - Add a policy for prioritizing resources in the event of a local, state or national disaster.
  - Adopt Clarifying Language
    - Clarify language related to expanding resources available through CES, definitions and regulations, roles and responsibilities, the use of case conferencing, and exits from CES.

- The CES Dashboard Ad Hoc composed of representatives from CES partner agencies met in October and November, to review and discuss existing data and reports available for CES.
- The OC HMIS Lead, OC United Way, is working on developing the dashboard based on feedback from the CES Dashboard Ad Hoc.
- The CES Dashboard Ad Hoc will meet in March to review and discuss the draft dashboard.
- The CES Dashboard Ad Hoc will continue to report progress and recommendations to the CES Steering Committee.

### **FY 2023 CoC Program Award Announcement**

- On, January 29, 2024, HUD announced \$3.2 billion in Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 CoC Competition Awards to approximately 7,000 local homeless housing and service programs across the United States and its territories.
- The Orange County CoC has been awarded \$34,301,133 for FY 2023.
- The funding represents
  - 24 renewal projects, including the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and CES components
  - One new project awarded to Families Forward created through reallocation
  - CoC Planning Grant

**Total Annual Renewal Amount Awarded:** \$32,801,133 **CoC Planning Awarded:** \$1,500,000

- Thank you to all volunteers!
- A special thank you to CalOptima Health and Orange County United Way for their donations!
- Over 1,100 volunteers collectively contributed more than 4,000 hours of service, with 392 volunteers in the North Service Planning Area (SPA), 435 volunteers in the Central SPA, and 273 volunteers in the South SPA.
- Volunteers assembled over 6,000 hygiene kits and snack packs.
- The Office of Care Coordination expects the 2024
   Point In Time Count results in early May.





#### **Brown Act Update**

- At this time, the CoC Board and all associated committees are to adhere to the Ralph M. Brown Act (Brown Act) requirements.
