WHAT IS CAIR?





DEFINING ISLAMOPHOBIA

- ◆ Islamophobia is <u>close-minded</u> prejudice against or hatred of Islam and Muslims.
 - Private Islamophobia is the fear, suspicion, and violent targeting of Muslims (and perceived Muslims) by individuals and private actors.
 - ◆ Structural Islamophobia is the fear and suspicion of Muslims on the part of institutions—most notably, government agencies—that is manifested through the enactment and advancement of expansion of formal surveillance, profiling, and immigration policy.
 - ◆ Dialectical Islamophobia is the process by which state policies endorse ingrained and popular tropes of Muslims as lien, inassimilable, and prone to extremism. It emboldens the private animus of Muslims. The broader polity absorbs the presumptive suspicion the state assigns to Muslims by way of discriminatory policies.



Private Islamophobia



CAIR National recorded 144 anti-mosque incidents in 2017 across the US

- -Hate crimes at a mosque accounted for 57 incidents
- -Intimidation accounted for 42 incidents
- -Harassment made up 24 incidents

In 2017, CAIR-CA's four offices reported a combined total of 197 matters classified either as hate crimes or hate incidents.

Private Islamophobia-Case Study Intimidation at Mosques

Yesterday around 11:00pm a group of guys came to the Perris Islamic Center wearing bulletproof vests and body cameras. They were holding camcorders and stood outside recording everyone. Our community was startled and reactions varied from members leaving home early, some wanted to call 911, and some wanted to fight these strangers. Fortunately we quickly determined that these guys were not a threat but were clearly misinformed about Islam...just like many other people in America. A group from our community spoke to the strangers and a productive dialogue occurred. We spoke at lengths about Islam and was able to better inform the recorders. What started off as a tense stand-off ended very well with nice hugs and hand shakes. However, it made me realize that a plan should be developed in case of an emergency.





Structural Islamophobia

Muslim Ban

 Campaign and then election of President Trump, who demonized Muslims during the campaign calling for a "complete and total shutdown" of Muslims entering the US. He moved quickly to pass a ban on immigrants and refugees from Muslim-majority countries once in office. Trump's endorsement of hate ideas and bigotry against Muslims both in the campaign and since he took office fueled Islamophobia.


PATRIOT ACT, National Security Entry Exit Registration System (NSEERS), and CVE/PVE

• While a number of modern government policies fit within the structural Islamophobia classification, the PATRIOT Act (and accompanying immigration legislation) and emergent counter-radicalization (or CVE) policing are the two most salient examples. These policies are built upon the presumption that Muslim identity is associated with a national security threat, and while they are usually framed in a facially neutral fashion, such policies disproportionately target Muslim subjects and disparately jeopardize, chill, and curtail their civil liberties.

Anti-Sharia Law Bills in the United States Introduced and Enacted



Anti-Sharia Legislation

By 2017, according to the Haas Institute at the University of California at Berkeley, the total number of such legislative efforts added up to 217 bills in 43 states. A handful of states, including Texas and Arkansas, have made the bills law.



Dialectical Islamophobia

Like other forms of bigotry, the shape of Islamophobia is contingent upon mass-media representations, political rhetoric and messaging, and most crucially, government programming and policy. It emboldens the private animus of Muslims.

How?

- -Hate crimes targeting U.S. Muslims rose 15 percent in 2017, which includes 300 incidents
- -The 300 hate crimes were a slice of the 2,599 incidents CAIR logged as representing anti-Muslim bias in 2017, a figure that was up 17 percent from 2016.
- -More than one-third of the incidents involved federal agencies, representing an almost unprecedented level of government hostility toward a religious minority within the U.S.




Anti-Muslim Hate Groups

Mass activism against Muslims didn't really develop until 2010, in the wake of the battle over the so-called "Ground Zero" mosque (for Muslims known as Park51 or Cordoba House), purposely labeled in this incendiary way by its Muslim-bashing opponents.









Islamophobia Industry

- •Inciting hate toward American Muslims and Islam has become a multimillion-dollar business. A report released by CAIR and University of California Berkeley's Center for Race and Gender, the report names 74 groups it says contribute in some way to Islamophobia in the US. Of those groups, it says, the primary purpose of 33 "is to promote prejudice against, or hatred of, Islam and Muslims".
- The core group, which includes the Abstraction Fund, Clarion Project, David Horowitz Freedom Center, Middle East Forum, American Freedom Law Center, Center for Security Policy, Investigative Project on Terrorism, Jihad Watch and Act! for America, had access to almost \$206 million of funding between 2008 and 2013.




Islamophobia: The Anti-Semitism Stereotype

Islamophobia: The Anti-Semitism Stereotype

- **Canary Mission** is a website dedicated to profiling Muslim students and Palestinian human rights activists. Its profiles are filled with falsehoods, misrepresentations and errors. Its inflammatory accusations that those it targets are guilty of anti-Semitism, support for terrorism and/or hatred of the United States are particularly dangerous in the present political climate.
- By producing what is in effect a blacklist, reminiscent of McCarthyism, Canary Mission seeks to silence vulnerable students especially Muslims, people of Middle Eastern origin and people of color so as to dissuade them, and others, from advocating publicly on matters of social and racial justice.
- Canary Mission contends that any criticism of Israeli policy, any form of support for Palestinian human rights
 and any criticism of U.S. policy in the Middle East are all tantamount to anti-Semitism and support for terrorism.



How is CAIR Combating Islamophobia?

Educating & Empowering the Muslim Community

• People who are not familiar with their rights cannot easily defend their rights. CAIR and other civil rights organizations have therefore delivered dozens of Know Your Rights seminars at mosques in recent years so that the community has the knowledge and confidence to protect itself.

Engaging With People of Different Backgrounds & Building Coalitions

• Education is without doubt the best vaccine against discrimination. For that reason, "enhancing understanding of Islam" has been part of CAIR's mission since its founding. For over 20 years, CAIR's mission statement has called for the organization to "build coalitions that promote justice and mutual understanding."

Countering Anti-Muslim Hate Groups

Even as American Muslims dialogue with our neighbors and collaborate with other civil rights groups, we must also confront anti-Muslim extremists who seek to spread the disease of bigotry. CAIR's national office long ago established a Department to Monitor & Combat Islamophobia, which tracks the complex web of Islamophobic groups operating across the U.S.
