## Domestic Violence (DV) Committee Chair

- At the February 17, 2026, meeting of the Domestic Violence (DV) Committee, Maricela Rios-Faust, as the current Chair of the committee, shared that she would be stepping down after being elected CoC Board Chair and had asked Shakoya Green-Long to consider serving as the new committee Chair.
- Shakoya Green-Long confirmed interest, and the DV Committee membership provided support for the nomination while expressing gratitude to Maricela Rios-Faust for her leadership.
- The appointment of Shakoya Green-Long to the Domestic Violence Committee Chair, will formalize the Chair appointment with the start of her current CoC Board term.

## Policies, Procedures and Standards (PPS) Committee At-Large Member

- The PPS Committee Governance Charter requires at least one (1) and no more than two (2) at-large members of the CoC Board to participate as PPS Committee members and provides the ability for CoC Committee Chairs to appoint a representative from their respective committees to the PPS Committee, should they be unable to participate.
- CoC Board Chair Maricela Rios-Faust and PPS Committee Chair Nishtha Mohendra agreed that appointing an additional at-large member to the PPS Committee would both create further opportunities for CoC Board members and help ensure the PPS Committee's quorum remains an odd number.
- The CoC Board is being asked to appoint Marisol Johnson as a new at-large member to the PPS Committee.

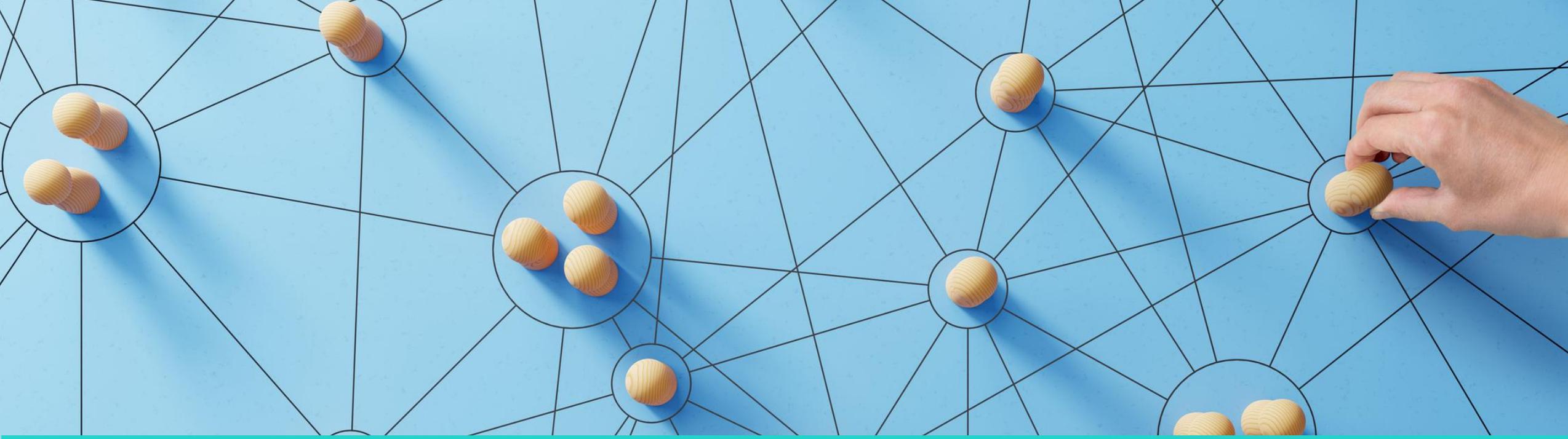

## Background

- Data requests from entities not participating in HMIS are required to be approved by the CoC Board prior to any data being released
- In January 2026, Homebase was approved to receive aggregate data by project to support the Orange County CoC Fiscal & Resource Mapping Project, including project descriptor, funding source, bed inventory, and performance data
- Homebase noted that there may be a need to request additional data from the Orange County CoC

## Data Request

- Authorizes the release of all relevant data needed by Homebase, in addition to the original CoC Board-approved request, to carry out the Orange County's CoC Fiscal and Resource Mapping project
- This request ensures a timely response and removes barriers to providing data needed to move forward with this analysis
- Data provided will not include any client identifying data
- Any additional data provided to Homebase will be shared with the CoC Board at a future meeting

## Orange County Fiscal & Resource Mapping Project: HMIS Data Request

# Project Summary

**WHO** Partnership between Homebase, County of Orange Office of Care Coordination, CoC, and local stakeholders.

**WHAT** Fiscal and resource mapping project to understand how funds in Orange County flow into the homeless response system, identify gaps, and inform future strategic investment.

**WHEN** Approximately 18 months

**WHY** To support the CoC Strategic Plan goal to “identify funding gaps and develop funding strategies to fill those gaps in alignment with [the] plan's priorities.”

# Project Goals

- Identify funding gaps in the homeless system
- Increase transparency and accountability in how funds are invested
- **Assess system and intervention-type performance to understand impact of funding**
- Provide data to inform future strategic planning and funding decisions
- Strengthen collaboration between funders, providers, and stakeholders

# HMIS Data Request Update

- Homebase's initial HMIS data request was approved by the CoC Board on 1/21/26
- Homebase began receiving data from the United Way HMIS team on 2/12/26 with more data to come
- As Homebase analyzes the data, it's possible that additional HMIS data requests will be made to supplement the analysis
- The request of the CoC Board today is to authorize the Office of Care Coordination, as the CES Lead and CoC Administrative Entity, and Orange County United Way, as the HMIS Lead, to provide all relevant project-level aggregate data to Homebase to carry out the Orange County CoC fiscal and resource mapping initiative, in addition to the previously-approved HMIS data request

## FY 2024 and FY 2025 CoC Program NOFO Competition

### NOFO Reopening

- The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) reopened the FY 2024 and FY 2025 CoC NOFO Competition on January 9, 2026.

### Funding Available to the Orange County CoC:

- Estimated Annual Renewal Demand (ARD) – \$33,248,577
- CoC Bonus – \$0
- DV Bonus – \$0
- CoC Planning – \$1,500,000

**Application Due Date:** February 9, 2026, at 5:00 p.m. PT

# Business Calendar – Item #3

## Submission of FY 2025 CoC Program Project Priority Listing

- On February 6, 2025, the County of Orange’s Office of Care Coordination as the Collaborative Applicant submitted the final FY2025 Project Priority Listing to HUD.
- Following HUD guidance that most renewal applications and CoC Planning projects will carry over from the FY2024 CoC Application, only new expansion project applications were submitted along with their respective renewal project applications.
- New expansion projects, applied for using reallocation funding, were ranked according to the approved FY2025 Orange County CoC Program Priority Listing.

# Business Calendar – Item #3

## Impact of Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2026

The Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2026 sets the following requirements for **FY 2025 Funding** for timely contract renewals:

- HUD must immediately non-competitively renew all projects expiring in **Quarter One** (January through March) of 2026 for a 12-month period.
- If HUD does not make awards by April, HUD must non-competitively renew all projects expiring in **Quarter Two** (April through June) of 2026 for a 12-month period.
- If HUD does not make awards by July, HUD must non-competitively renew all projects expiring in **Quarters Three and Four** (July through December) of 2026 for a 12-month period.
- Projects renewed under this provision cannot be penalized or deemed ineligible for any new funding opportunity for FY25 or FY26.

The Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2026 sets the following requirements for **FY 2026 Funding**:

- \$4.01 billion for the CoC Program
- HUD must keep Tier 1 funding – the amount of funding that is awarded based on local CoC priorities, also known as Annual Renewal Demand – at 60 percent or higher. This is an increase from the 30% HUD proposed in its now moot FY25 CoC funding competition.
- HUD must release the FY26 NOFO for the CoC program by June 1, 2026, and make awards by December 1, 2026.

# Business Calendar – Item #3

## CoC Program Funding Litigation Update

- On February 17, 2026, HUD filed an emergency motion for Case 1:25-cv-00636-MSM-AEM to dissolve the December 19, 2025, Preliminary Injunction that temporarily stopped the December 2025 NOFO, stating that there is no longer any immediate, irreversible harm to providers and their communities.
- In its filing with the court, HUD acknowledges the Department must noncompetitively renew expiring grants in the first quarter and likely the second quarter based on the direction from Congress included in the FY26 Transportation-Housing and Urban Development appropriation.
- HUD also expressed its intent, if their motion is granted, to proceed with opening the [December 2025 NOFO](#) by April 1, 2026, to run a 2025 CoC competition only including project awards expiring in the second half of the year (quarters 3 and 4).
  - *Note: this would include a majority (19) of Orange County CoC projects*
- HUD has asked the Court for an expedited ruling on their request by March 2, 2026.
- Yesterday, [the National Alliance to End Homelessness legal team submitted a strong set of arguments in opposition](#). The Plaintiffs in the related litigation, led by states, also responded.
- At this time, the Office of Care Coordination continues to monitor updates of the litigation and will provide more concrete information as it arises.

## **HMIS Data Quality Policy Recommendation**

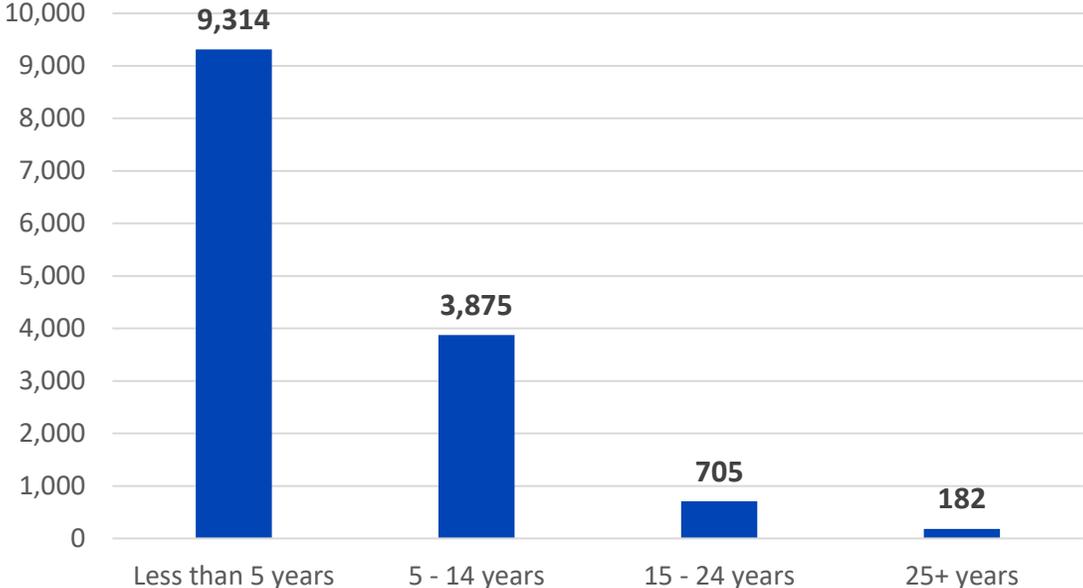

## Background

- At the January 2026 CoC Board meeting, the HMIS Lead provided an update on the System Performance Measures (SPM) report, and noted that the Length of Homelessness measure has continued to increase year-over-year, resulting in points lost on the CoC Application
- This increase was largely due to clients that reported very old dates that their current episode of homelessness began, which is captured in the Approximate Date Homelessness Started (ADHS) field
- The initial proposal from the HMIS Lead was to target enrollments where clients said their current episode of homelessness was at least 25 years (ADHS prior to 1/1/2000), and the HMIS Lead would change these dates to the client's Project Start Date
- At the direction of the CoC Board, the HMIS Lead has discussed the development of a data quality policy to correct this field with the Lived Experience Advisory Committee (LEAC); Policies, Procedures, and Standards (PPS) Committee, and the Service Provider Forum
  - Note: the discussion at the Service Provider Forum included 63 attendees, representative of 32 agencies and some individuals

# Approximate Date Homelessness Started

- The Approximate Date Homelessness Started (ADHS) field reflects the date the client’s **current** episode of homelessness began, and it is used in measure 1b of the System Performance Measures to determine how long a client has experienced homelessness
- After analyzing the enrollments in the reporting period, there are approximately 887 enrollments with a reported ADHS that was before January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2010, meaning client’s current episode of homelessness is over 15 years
- Of those, approximately 182 enrollments had a reported ADHS that was before January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2000, meaning client’s current episode of homelessness is over 25 years



## CoC Committee Feedback

- Feedback from the LEAC, PPS Committee, and Service Provider Forum meeting participants can be referenced in **Attachment A**.
- Below is a summary of some key points that were shared:
  - The CoC committees were unsupportive of changing the client's ADHS to an arbitrary date
  - The HMIS Lead was asked to verify whether clients that reported an ADHS prior to 1/1/2000 was accurate
  - Most service providers stated that it was uncommon for a client's current episode of homelessness to be 25 years or more
  - More user training is needed to ensure accurate data is collected

## Data Review

- The HMIS Lead reviewed the client histories for 112 clients that reported their current episode of homelessness was 25 years or more
- Of those 112 clients, the HMIS Lead determined that 97 (87%) of them had breaks in homelessness, which means the ADHS entered is incorrect
  - 60 clients (54%): The client reported a later date that their current episode of homelessness began in a previous enrollment
  - 12 clients (11%): The client had a permanent housing placement prior to the enrollment
  - 3 clients (3%): The client's Homelessness Verification or Chronic Homelessness Verification documentation lists a later date that their current episode of homelessness began
  - 22 clients (20%): The client reported being homeless multiple times in the past three years, and the client's HMIS history suggests breaks in homelessness

## Proposed Policy

- Identify client records with lengths of homelessness greater than 25 years indicated in the Approximate Date Homelessness Started (ADHS) field, and correct the ADHS field to a later date determined from the client's record, for the reasons listed below.
  - The client reported a later date that their current episode of homelessness began in a previous enrollment, signifying that the Approximate Date Homelessness Started in question is inaccurate.
  - The client had a permanent housing placement prior to the enrollment, which signifies a break in homelessness.
  - The client's Homelessness Verification or Chronic Homelessness Verification documentation lists a later date that their current episode of homelessness began, signifying that the Approximate Date Homelessness Started in question is inaccurate.
  - The client reported being homeless multiple times in the past three years, and the client's HMIS history suggests breaks in homelessness.

# Implementation

- If approved, the HMIS Lead will correct data for Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing, or Permanent Housing enrollments active during the SPM reporting period (10/1/24 – 9/30/25) that meet the policy criteria (approximately 97 enrollments)
- Corrections will be made prior to the SPM due date on March 4<sup>th</sup>
- Data will not be changed for enrollments where a later ADHS cannot be identified
- Agencies will be notified of the new ADHS date, and the reason for the change
- The HMIS Lead will provide additional training to reduce these errors for future reporting

- **CES core functions:**
  - Access • Assessment • Prioritization • Referral • Direct Assistance
- Performance and experience across SPAs and CES subpopulations
- Alignment between **needs, capacity, and resources**

## How We're Evaluating CES

- **Mixed-methods, equity-driven evaluation** combining:
  - Quantitative data analysis (HMIS, HUD system performance, system modeling)
  - Qualitative input (people with lived experience, staff, providers, partners)
  - Policy and workflow review
- Examine CES performance **across regions/Service Planning Areas (SPAs) and subpopulations**
- Balance **HUD compliance requirements** with forward-looking system improvement and innovation opportunities

- *Is CES **compliant** with HUD requirements?*
- *Does CES **equitably, efficiently, and effectively** resolve housing crises?*
- *Are housing and service interventions more efficient and effective because of CES?*
- *Does CES connect people to the **right available housing and services**?*
- *Are housing and service resources available through CES **sufficient and appropriately targeted** by subpopulation and SPA?*
- *What are opportunities to improve CES to better meet local needs?*

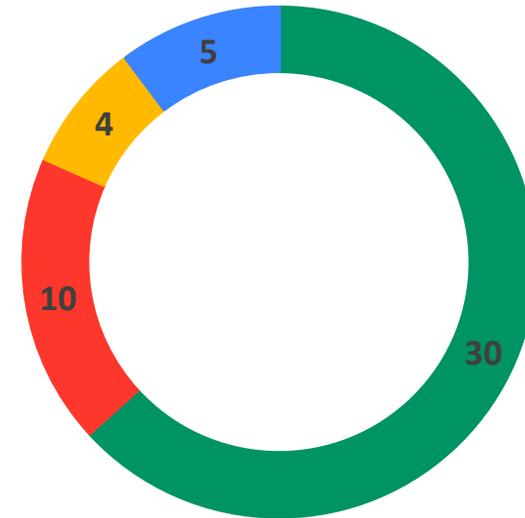

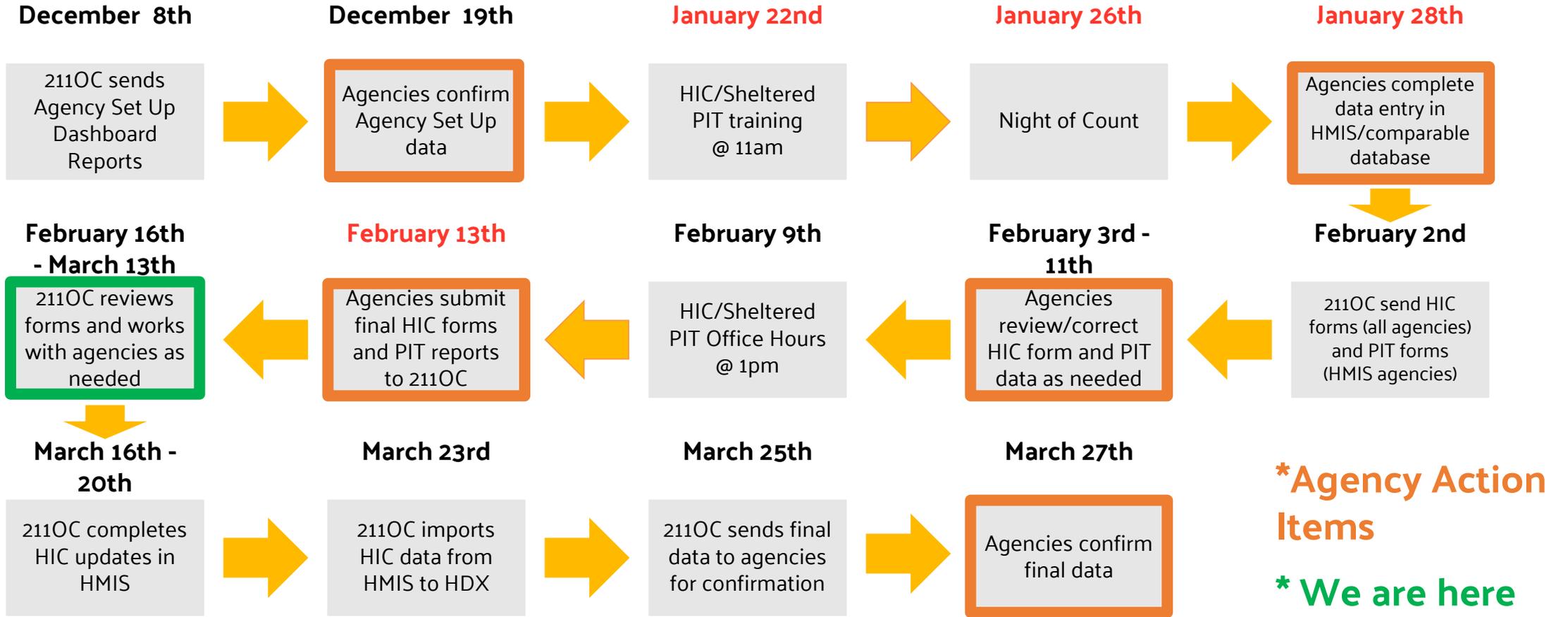
# 2026 Housing Inventory Count and Sheltered Point-In-Time

- Annual HUD compliance reports
- Deadline for agencies to submit HIC and PIT data was February 13<sup>th</sup>
- HIC forms for 184 of 248 projects (74%) have been submitted so far

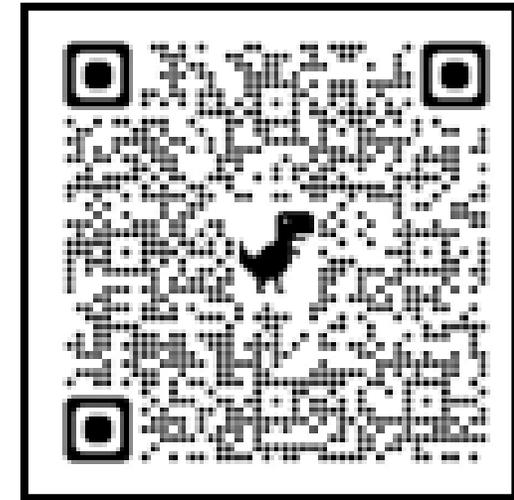
- The Behavioral Health Services Act (BHSA) requires counties to submit three-year Integrated Plans (IPs) for Behavioral Health Services and Outcomes.

## BHSA Housing Implementation Working Group

- In January 2026, the Office of Care Coordination (OCC) coordinated a BHSA Feedback Session for CoC-Funded Agencies to provide space for discussion around the potential for BHSA funds to support the Orange County CoC's housing and supportive service projects.
- During the feedback session, attendees discussed creating a working group as a next step, to continue conversations and support with implementation.
- The OC HCA's Behavioral Health Services will be partnering with OCC on the outreach and facilitation of a BHSA Housing Implementation Working Group, focused on implementation of the Housing component of Orange County Behavioral Health Integrated Plan.
- The Working Group will begin towards the end of March 2026 and involve a range of 7 – 9 members, inclusive of representation from OCC, CoC Board members, CoC-funded agencies, and other stakeholders within the Orange County CoC.

## Homeless Prevention Framework Project

- The Office of Care Coordination has contracted with the Corporation for Supportive Housing (CSH) to develop a comprehensive homeless prevention model rooted in best practices that ensures proactive utilization of all homeless prevention resources and prioritizes homelessness prevention efforts. Development will take place over three (3) phases.
  - ❖ Phase 1: Committee Structure and Workplan Development
  - ❖ Phase 2: Landscape Assessment and Partner Engagement
  - ❖ Phase 3: Recommendations for Orange County homelessness prevention program models

## National Standards for the Physical Inspection of Real Estate (NSPIRE) Revised Compliance Date

- On September 30, 2025, published the notice titled, “Economic Growth Regulatory Relief and Consumer Protection Act: Implementation of National Standards for the Physical Inspection of Real Estate (NSPIRE); Extension of NSPIRE Compliance Date for CPD Programs” (FR-6086-N-11) in the Federal Register.
- The notice further extends the compliance date for HUD’s NSPIRE final rule for Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG), CoC, HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME), and the Housing Trust Fund (HTF) programs until **October 1st, 2026**.
- This third extension of the compliance date will allow recipients and grantees additional time to implement HUD’s NSPIRE standards. Additionally, HUD has determined that some types of units funded under the CoC and ESG programs may not meet certain requirements of the NSPIRE standards as they are applied to other HUD programs.
- HUD intends to publish standards specific to each of these programs before the compliance date.

### Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) Program Letters of Support

- The SSVF grant, administered by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), provides rapid re-housing and homelessness prevention services to Veterans experiencing homelessness, in effort to help Veterans secure and retain permanent housing.
- As part of the application process, agencies are strongly encouraged to provide letters of support from the local CoC, reflecting the applicant's engagement in the CoC's efforts to coordinate services.
- The Office of Care Coordination, as the Collaborative Applicant for the Orange County CoC, received requests for CoC Letters of support from the following two (2) organizations as part of the application process for SSVF renewal funding: 1736 and Volunteers of America Los Angeles (VOALA).
- Given the existing involvement in the CoC, the Collaborative Applicant provided letters of support to both applicants.

## Homeless Veterans' Reintegration Program (HVRP) Letters of Support

- On February 15, 2026, the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) announced the HVRP Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA).
- HVRP is an employment-focused, competitive federal grant program intended to enable veterans experiencing or at risk of homelessness reach their full employment potential and obtain high-quality career outcomes.
  - As part of a new application requirement for Program Year 2025, organizations were required to provide a CoC Letter of support.
- Applications are due by March 6, 2026.
- The Office of Care Coordination as the Collaborative Applicant for the Orange County CoC received requests from four (4) organizations for a CoC Letter of support: America Works, Managed Career Solutions, Human Works Foundation and Orange County United Way.
- The Office of Care Coordination is in process of finalizing the letters of support to send to the listed agencies.
