- The nomination and election of Officers will occur amongst CoC Board members via roll call vote, with instructions provided by the current Chair.

FY 2024 and FY 2025 CoC Program NOFO Competition

- On December 1, 2025, the National Alliance to End Homelessness (NAEH) and other partners sued the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) challenging the FY2025 CoC Program NOFO.
- On December 23, 2025, a federal court issued a written preliminary injunction that affected HUD's CoC funding process. HUD was required to take steps to process eligible renewal projects for FY 2025 using the FY 2024–2025 CoC Program NOFO rules. However, the court made clear that this order does not require HUD to award or obligate funds yet.
- On January 9, 2026, HUD reopened FY2024 and FY2025 CoC Program NOFO. Applications from Collaborative Applicants are due to HUD by **February 9, 2026**.

NOFO Reopening

- HUD reopened the FY 2024 and FY 2025 CoC NOFO Competition (FY24/25 NOFO) on January 9, 2026.

Funding Available to the Orange County CoC:

- Estimated Annual Renewal Demand (ARD) – \$33,248,577
- CoC Bonus – \$0
- DV Bonus – \$0
- CoC Planning – \$1,500,000

CoC Reallocation Recommendations

- Reallocation is a process that CoCs use to shift funds in whole or in part from existing eligible renewal projects to create one or more new projects without affecting the CoC's Annual Renewal Demand (ARD).
- HUD incentivizes CoCs to evaluate project performance and gives points in the Consolidated Application to CoCs that either reallocate funding from lower performing projects to create new higher performing projects or have process to review the performance of existing projects and reallocate funding from lower performing projects to higher performing projects.
- Voluntary reallocation of funding is also an option for CoC-funded agencies.
- Following the communication regarding the FY2024 and FY2025 CoC Program NOFO, the Office of Care Coordination reached out to CoC-Funded Agencies to confirm their plans of either renewing 100%, transitioning a project, or reallocating the renewal funding.
- Ultimately, American Family Housing determined not to apply for renewal funding as part of the FY2025 CoC Program Competition and has remained in conversation with the Office of Care Coordination for the ramp down of their permanent supportive housing project.

Business Calendar – Item #2

CoC Reallocation Recommendations

- Given HUD’s policy direction for the future CoC Program NOFO Competitions, the Office of Care Coordination recommended that the CoC NOFO Ad Hoc consider reallocating the funds to expand current rapid rehousing (RRH) and Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) CoC-Funded projects.
- An expansion project combines an existing eligible renewal project with up to two new projects that request funding to expand the existing project.
- The CoC NOFO Ad Hoc recommends that the reallocation funding be utilized to expand Families Forward’s Rapid Rehousing for Families project, Interval House’s Rapid Rehousing Program project and Orange County United Way's HMIS Consolidated Community Support project.
- The Collaborative Applicant will work with the identified agencies to finalize the new, expansion projects. These recommendations will support the Orange County CoC in ensuring the reallocation funding is budgeted locally with a quick turnaround.

FY2025 Priority Listing Recommendations

- Per the reopened FY2024 and FY2025 CoC Program NOFO, projects that were awarded FY 2024 funds and are not being reallocated, may be eligible for selection for FY 2025 funds using their FY 2024 application submission and are not required to apply for renewal for FY 2025 funds.
- As such, the Office of Care Coordination as the Collaborative Applicant for the Orange County CoC is recommending renewal projects to proceed for FY2025 CoC Program funding, utilizing project scoring approved by the CoC Board during the FY2024 and FY2025 CoC Program NOFO competition.

CoC Project Ranking and Tiering Policy

- Utilizing the FY2024 CoC Project Ranking and Tiering Strategy that was approved by the CoC Board during the FY2024 and FY2025 CoC Program NOFO competition, the Office of Care Coordination developed an updated FY2025 Ranking and Tiering Strategy.
- The FY2025 Ranking and Tiering Strategy was brought forward to the CoC NOFO Ad Hoc and the CoC Board Past and Present Officer Advisory Group for review.

FY2025 Priority Listing Recommendations

Ranking and Tiering Strategy

Renewal Projects and Expansion Projects are to be ranked and tiered based on the following FY2025 Ranking and Tiering Strategy:

- Overall, the FY 2024 Renewal Project Score will be utilized and will be ranked from highest score to lowest score (except HMIS, CES projects) – *This is consistent with FY 2024.*
- HMIS and CES projects are placed above the straddling project due to being vital system infrastructure for the Orange County CoC – *This is consistent with FY 2024.*
- First-time renewal project is ranked after all renewal projects that have renewed more than once – *This is new for FY 2025.*
 - The first-time renewal project has no comparable score to utilize from FY 2024.
- Renewal Projects with terms ending in February 2026 – *This is new for FY 2025.*
 - Given the expected delays with funding, organizations are having to already make programmatic changes and updates. This strategic ranking of renewal projects with grant terms ending in February 2026 will support continued program operations of other renewal programs and has minimal impacts to current households being served by those programs that would be impacted should Tier 2 not be funded.
- New HMIS expansion project from reallocated funding is ranked higher than the new RRH projects – *This is new for FY2025, but consistent with FY 2024 to include new projects in Tier 2.*
- New RRH expansion projects from reallocated funding are ranked based on Agency's 2024 Renewal Project Score from highest score to lowest score – *This is new for FY2025, but consistent with FY2024 strategy for new projects in Tier 2.*

FY2025 Priority Listing Recommendations

- As noted in the reopened FY2024 and FY2025 CoC Program NOFO, Tier 1 of the Priority Listing is equal to 90% of the CoC’s ARD. As such, approximately \$3,324,858 of renewal funding fell into Tier 2 causing multiple renewal projects to be placed in Tier 2.
- Projects with a ranked position in Tier 1 are selected based on requirements in section I.B.3.h.(1) of the FY2024 and FY2025 CoC Program NOFO and projects with a ranked position in Tier 2 are selected based on the CoC Application score and the project application score outlined in section I.B.3.h.(2) of the NOFO.
- Utilizing the CoC Project Ranking and Tiering Strategy, the Office of Care Coordination as the Collaborative Applicant developed the proposed FY2025 Project Priority Listing.
- The proposed FY2025 Project Priority Listing was brought forward to the CoC NOFO Ad Hoc and the CoC Board Past and Present Officer Advisory Group for review.
- The following table displays the FY2025 CoC Project Priority Listing being recommended, included as Item 2. **Attachment A.**
 - The CoC Board is being asked to approve the FY2025 CoC Project Priority Listing, subject to change based on court proceedings and/or updated guidance from HUD.

Business Calendar – Item #2

Senate Appropriations Committee Funding Bill

- On January 19, 2026, the Senate Appropriations Committee released its funding bill, Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2026, that includes HUD funding.

For FY 2025

- HUD must Non-competitively renew projects for 12-months, if expiring during the **first quarter** of calendar year 2026
- *If awards are not made for FY2025 CoC Program NOFO by April 1, 2026, then HUD must non-competitive renew projects for 12-months for those expiring in the second quarter of calendar year 2026.*
- *If awards are not made for FY2025 CoC Program NOFO by July 1, 2026, then HUD must non-competitive renew projects for 12-months for those expiring in the third quarter of calendar year 2026.*
- Non-competitive renewal projects should receive the same funding levels plus cost of living adjustments.

For FY 2026 Homeless Assistance Grants – total is \$4.17 billion

- ESG - \$290 million
- CoC Program - \$4.01 Billion
 - DV Bonus, limited to RRH and SSO-CES Programs - \$52 million
 - Cost of Living Adjustments - \$43 million
 - YHDP Renewals
- Tier 1 cannot be less than 60% of ARD
- Requires HUD to issue the NOFO by June and make awards by December.



Orange County Fiscal & Resource Mapping Project: HMIS Data Request

Project Summary

WHO Partnership between Homebase, County of Orange Office of Care Coordination, CoC, and local stakeholders.

WHAT Fiscal and resource mapping project to understand how funds in Orange County flow into the homeless response system, identify gaps, and inform future strategic investment.

WHEN Approximately 18 months

WHY To support the CoC Strategic Plan goal to “identify funding gaps and develop funding strategies to fill those gaps in alignment with [the] plan's priorities.”

Project Goals

- Identify funding gaps in the homeless system
- Increase transparency and accountability in how funds are invested
- **Assess system and intervention-type performance to understand impact of funding**
- Provide data to inform future strategic planning and funding decisions
- Strengthen collaboration between funders, providers, and stakeholders

HMIS Data Request

- One component of this project is to **map major funding streams to current project- and system-level outcomes**
- HMIS data is requested to better understand the current funding landscape:
 1. What project types are funded by major funding sources? What households and subpopulations are supported by major funding sources?
 2. How do outcomes vary by project type and funding source?
 3. How effectively are investments supporting exits to permanent housing?
 4. How balanced is system investment? Are there gaps in inventory or funding?

Request Specifics

- One-time data request, with possibility of 1-2 related follow-up requests
- Project-level, aggregate data only (no client-level or personally identifiable information requested)
- Includes all active projects and all active project types from January 1, 2023 – December 31, 2025
- Data elements related to:
 - Project background information
 - Project funding
 - Project bed/unit inventory
 - Project performance outcomes

Using the Data

The HMIS data is needed to:

- Understand how funding aligns with project types, inventory of beds/units, and performance and system outcomes
- Create a comprehensive, systemwide record of current projects and funding
- Establish a solid foundation of data to be supplemented with additional funding and budgeting data requests to grant administrators and key stakeholders

Timeline & Reporting Back

- The **Office of Care Coordination** and an **Ad Hoc** Committee, which includes CoC Board members, will review interim analyses of data and provide feedback.
- Data will be used in evaluation reports and project deliverables. Draft products will be **reviewed by the CoC Board prior to finalization in late 2026.**
- Findings will be used for system-level planning. No plan to publish program- or agency-level evaluations.

Longitudinal Systems Analysis (LSA)

- Uses demographic and performance data to analyze how people experiencing homelessness use their system of care
- LSAs are compiled from each CoC and submitted to the U.S. Congress to inform federal, state, and local initiatives

- Results are expected to be available in the next couple months, and will be shared at a future meeting



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System Performance Measures Process

- The System Performance Measures (SPM) report is required to be submitted by HUD on an annual basis, and is expected to be due in February or March
- HUD uses data from the performance measures as selection criteria to award grants under the CoC Program
- Data Quality process:
 - Sent out quarterly Data Quality reports
 - Hosted LSA & SPM Office Hours – September 2025
 - Sent out LSA & SPM data for review – October 2025
 - Sent 2nd round of LSA & SPM data for review – November 2025
 - Offered support with one-on-one meeting November 2025 – January 2026
 - Identified agencies with most corrections needed for extra support – December 2025



Length of Homelessness Measure


Measure 1a: Length of stay in ES and TH projects

Approximate Date Homelessness Started

- The self-reported date the client's current episode of homelessness began
- After analyzing the enrollments in the reporting period, there are approximately 887 enrollments with a reported Approximate Date Homelessness Started that was before January 1st, 2010
- These dates are causing the Length of Homelessness measure to continue rising



HMIS Data Quality Strategies and Policy Development

During the review of this year's SPM data, 211OC noted many records in the Approximate Date Homelessness Started field that dated far back. Below are the steps taken by 211OC to attempt to correct these errors with the HMIS participating agencies. Despite these efforts, many issues remain.

Orange County CoC

- Regular reminders/trainings during User Meetings regarding proper data collection
- Quarterly corrections sent to Agency Administrators
- Data Quality Report Cards published quarterly
- Annual corrections sent during SPM & LSA
- Data quality reference guides and knowledge base articles
- Data quality reports available in HMIS

Southern California CoCs

- County and city send notices to agencies with outstanding data issues with deadlines to correct the data or submit an action plan
- Report agencies with outstanding issues to Governing Board for transparency/awareness
- Targeted support with key agencies
- Monthly one-on-one meetings with each agency

HMIS Data Quality Strategies and Policy Development

- The Approximate Date Homelessness Started field reflects the date the client's current episode of homelessness began, and it is used in measure 1b of the System Performance Measures to determine how long a client has experienced homelessness.
- These very old dates are causing the average Length of Homelessness for the CoC to increase, which is considered a negative result by HUD.
- It may be helpful for the CoC to consider an HMIS Data Quality Policy to address this.
- The HMIS Lead could review the Approximate Date Homelessness Started field for all Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing, and Permanent Housing projects active between October 1, 2024, and September 30, 2025, and if the Approximate Date Homelessness Started field occurs before January 1, 2000, the HMIS Lead will change this date to the client's Project Start Date for the enrollment.
- Impact: approximately 182 enrollments.





Volunteer Roles

- **Deployment Center Volunteers:** Run the check-in tables and greet volunteers when they arrive for their shifts or come back from their field work depending on if you are volunteering as a set-up or clean-up volunteer.
- **Field Surveyors:** Engage directly with our neighbors experiencing unsheltered homelessness and conduct the surveys through a secure application on their smartphone.
- **Team Captains:** Lead a team of two or more Field Surveyors in the field. Support the team to navigate the assigned maps, assist with the survey application, follow emergency protocols, and collect and return the team's supplies at the end of their shift.



Governor's Proposed 2026-27 State Budget

- The Governor’s proposed 2026-27 state budget to the Legislature on January 8, 2026 included a budget summary chapter entitled [Housing and Homelessness](#).
- Concerning homelessness, this chapter notes the following about the Homeless Housing, Assistance, and Prevention program (HHAP):
 - . . . there is a **seventh round totaling \$500 million planned**, contingent on enhanced accountability and performance requirements.*
- This is consistent with what is included in budget bill [SB 158](#) about HHAP Program Round 7.
- During fiscal year 2025–26, the State will prepare to administer HHAP Program Round 7 with the goal that, subject to subdivisions, initial round 7 disbursements will be available to grantees meeting the statutory provisions for disbursement beginning September 1, 2026.
