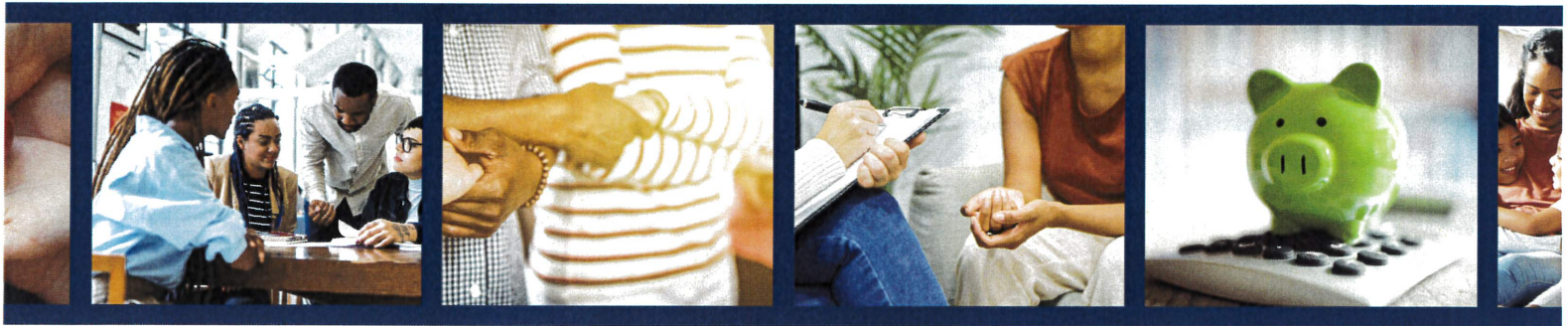

# BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES ACT OVERVIEW



The Behavioral Health Services Act (BHSA) was enacted January 1, 2025, requiring the OC Health Care Agency (HCA), Behavioral Health Services (BHS) to develop a Behavioral Health Integrated Plan (BHIP) through a Community Program Planning (CPP) process. The BHIP must be approved by the Orange County Board of Supervisors and submitted to the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) by June 30, 2026. BHSA services primarily support delivery of mental health and substance use disorder treatment for individuals living with severe behavioral health conditions.

The new law shifts the allowable use of BHSA funding (formerly Mental Health Services Act) to three new categories. 10% of the Behavioral Health Services Fund supports state operations and administration and is distributed to an array of state agencies.

The graphics to the right demonstrates the prescribed percentages, the types of programs that can be provided, and the estimated amount of BHSA funds that Orange County will have available for each category. Note: the dollar amounts represented to the right are subject to change as we wait for final allocations from DHCS anticipated in Fall 2025.



**Full Service Partnerships**  
**35% - \$86M**

Intense outpatient, field-based programs that provide multiple engagements and/or treatment services for qualified individuals. Supports are available 24/7.



**Behavioral Health Services and Supports**  
**35% - \$86M**

Programs for early intervention, crisis services, recovery supports, expanding treatment programs, and supporting workforce development. The majority of funding must be directed toward children and youth aged 25 and younger.



**Housing Interventions**  
**30% - \$73M**

Funds to pay for the cost for Medi-Cal members living with serious behavioral health conditions to obtain and maintain housing such as rent, basic necessities, and other supports. Supports must not be eligible for coverage by managed care plans to qualify.

## Community Planning

A process in which county BHS engages with community stakeholders in the development of a three year BHIP. The purpose is to provide open, meaningful engagement opportunities to all interested stakeholders, allowing opportunities to provide feedback on decisions related to the BHIP. Counties can use up to 5% of the BHSA funding to support community planning staffing and activities. For more information, please see CPP Briefing.

## Committees and Focus

**Groups:** Establish BHSA focused workgroups consisting of county and community partners and begin hosting focus groups.



**Plan and Assess:** Begin community planning with listening sessions, data sessions, and informing/including community partners.

June to September 2025



**Program Planning:** Review BHSA requirements, operationalize workgroups, build draft recommendations, host Community Forums, begin building evaluation plans.

October to December 2025

**Draft Plan:** Workgroups create draft BHSA category plans, provide overview throughout county and adjust based on feedback.



January to March 2026

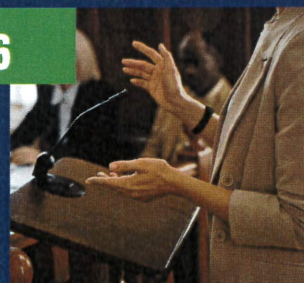
**Approve & Post:** Request review and approval from DHCS, conduct 30 day public comment and posting, and continue community engagement and education on plan.



April to June 2026

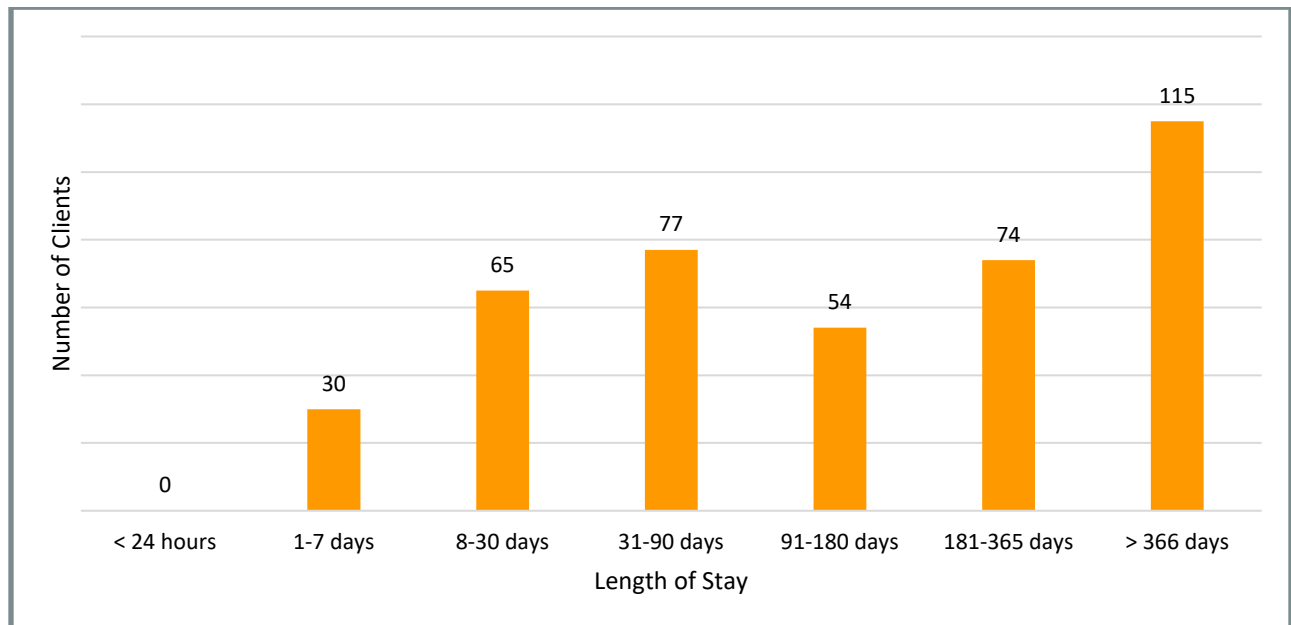

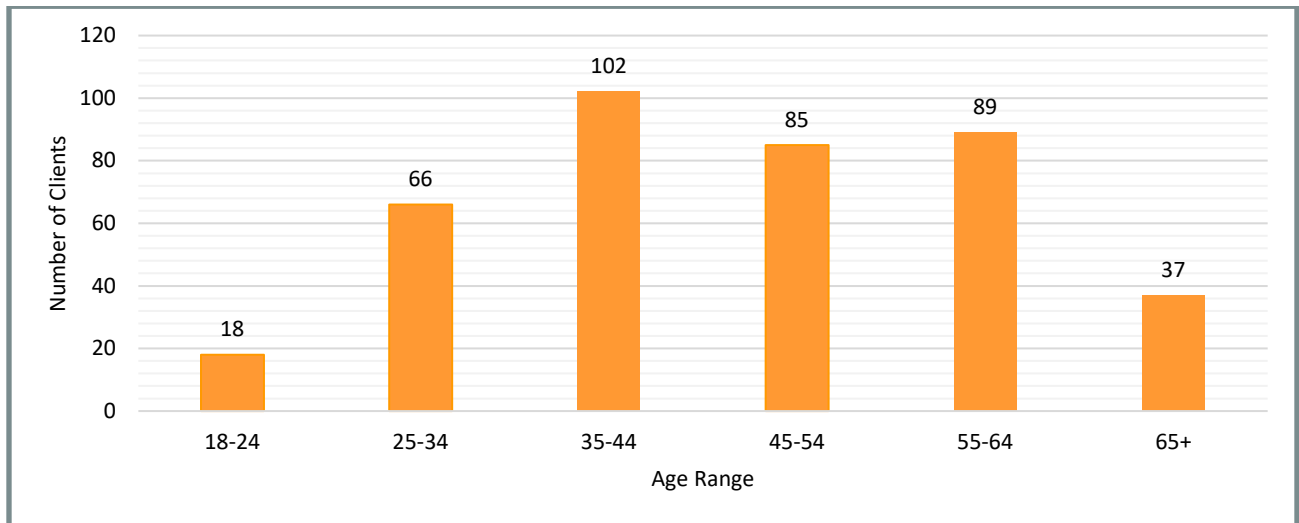

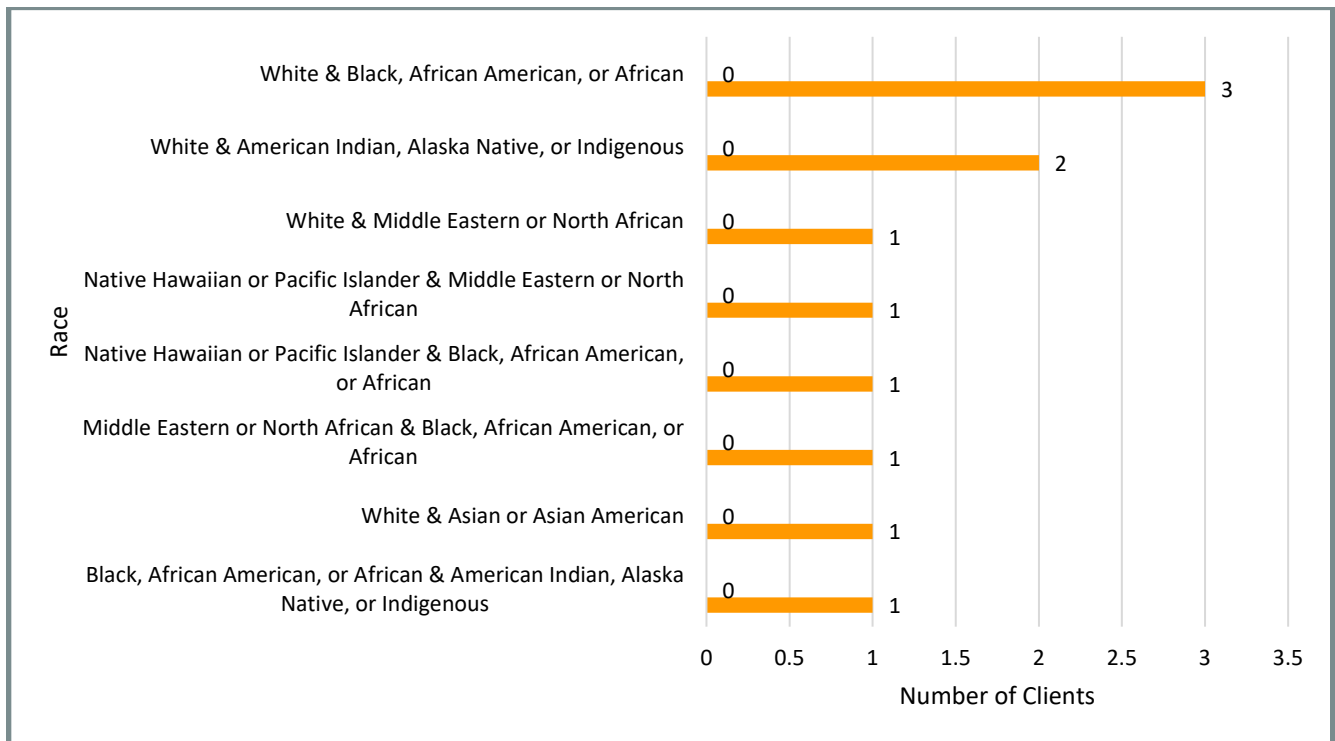

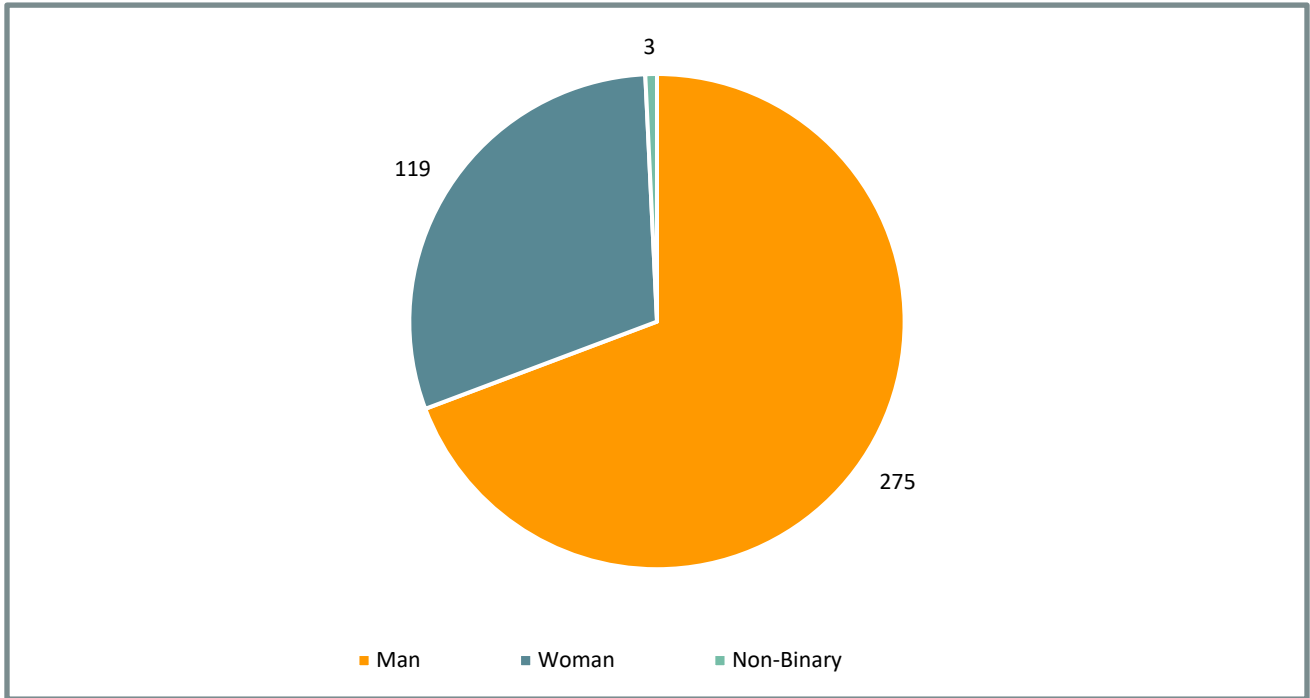

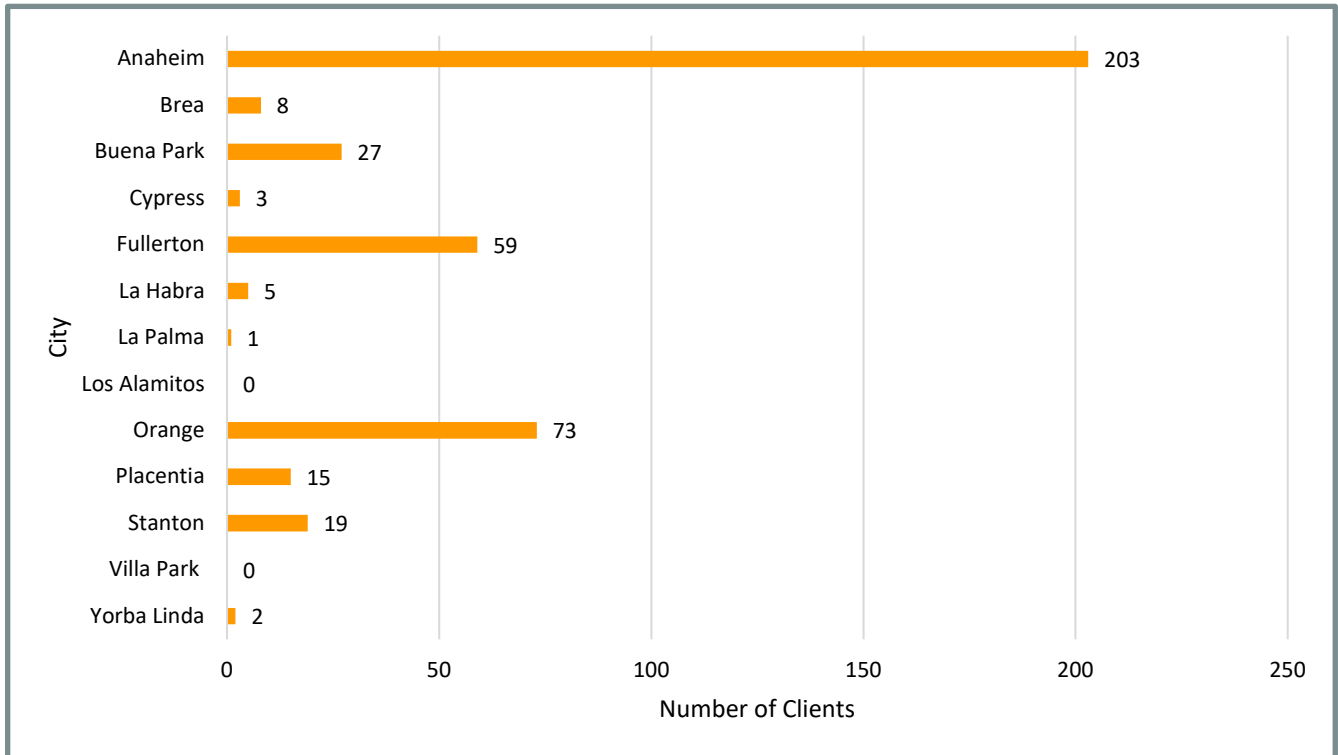

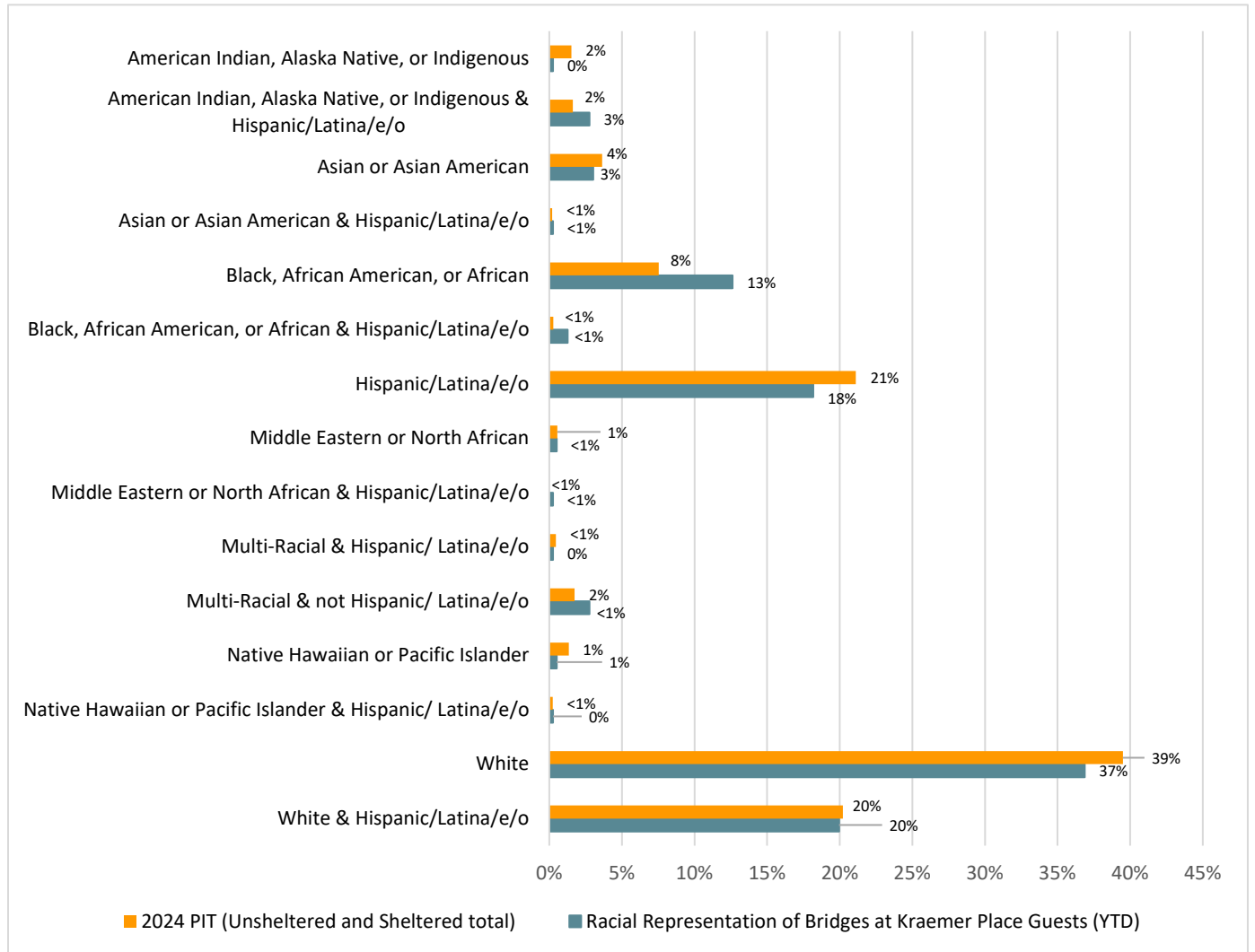

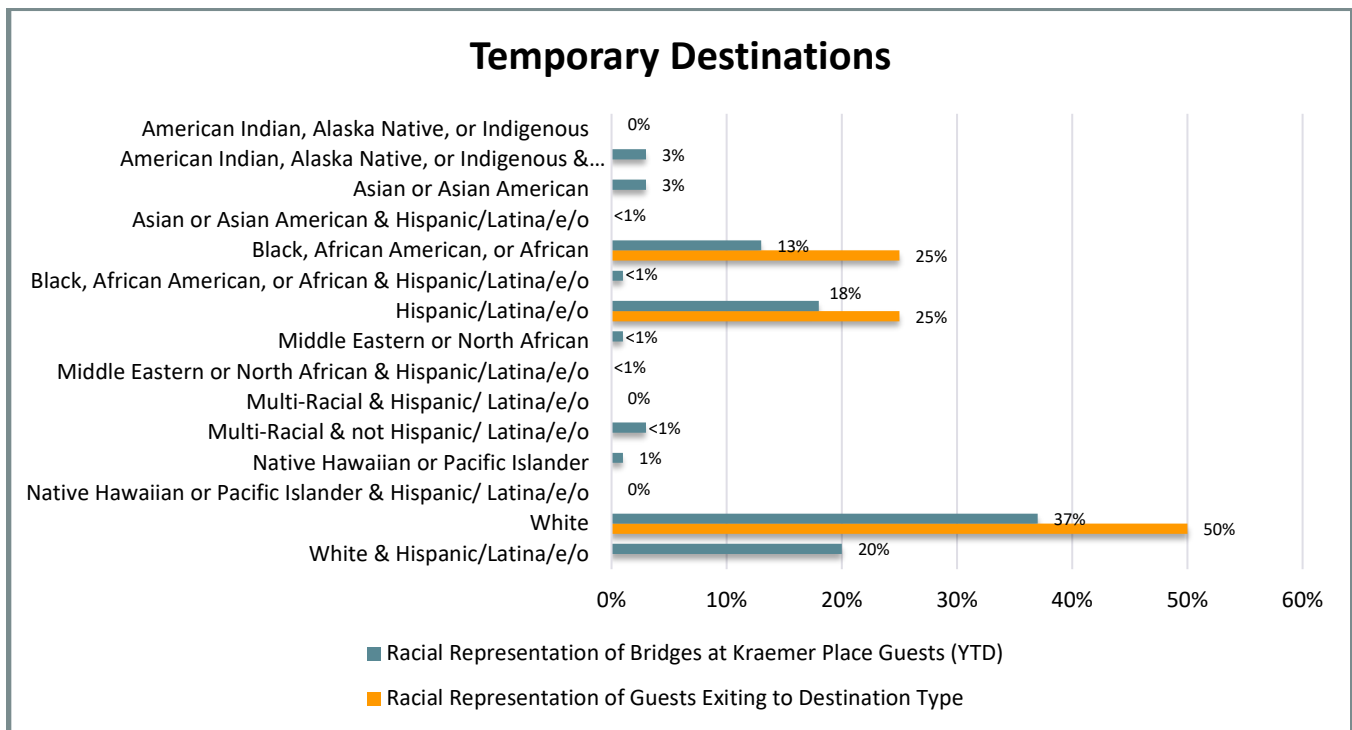
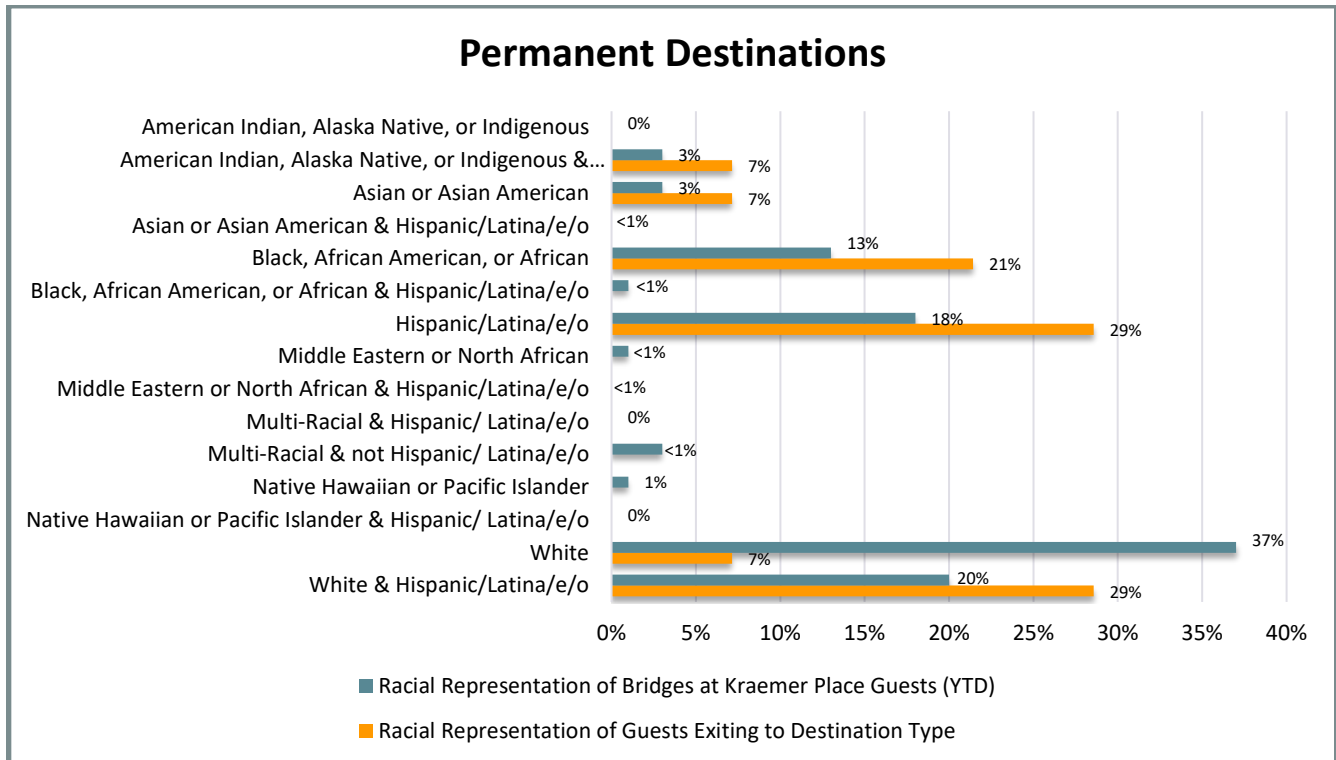
# Racial Equity Analysis – YTD

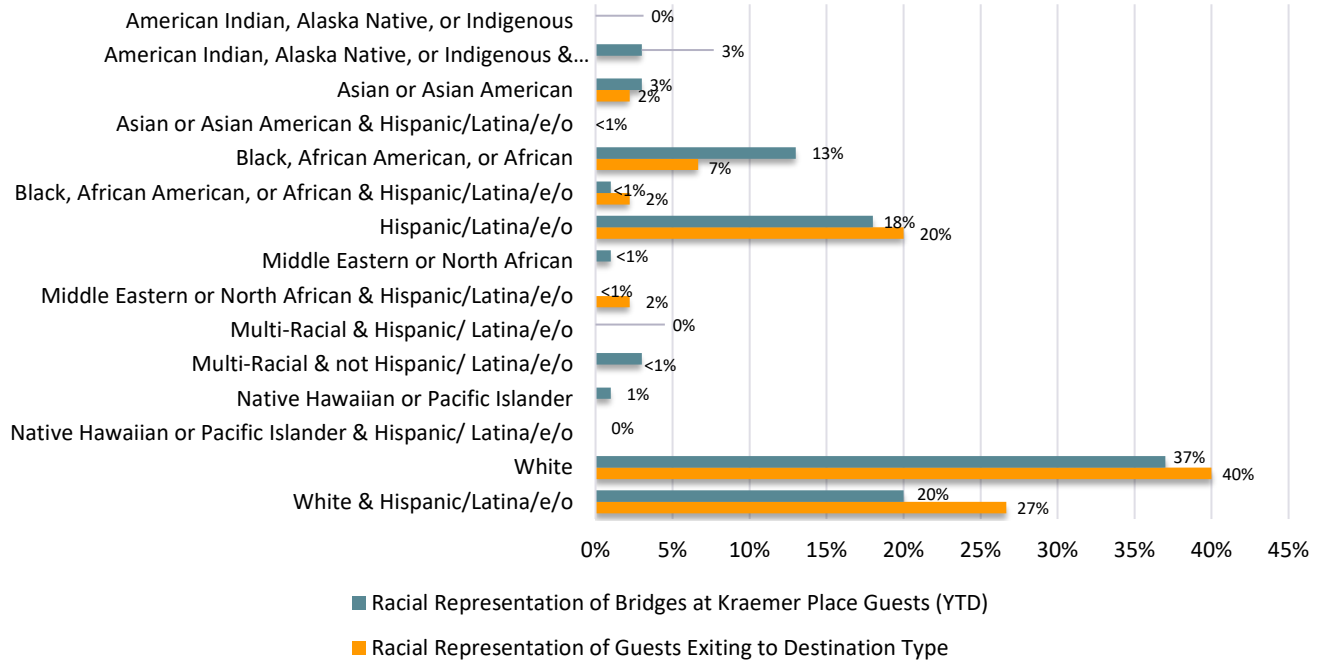


# Exit Destination Type by Racial Categories compared to Racial Representation of Bridges at Kraemer Place Shelter Population

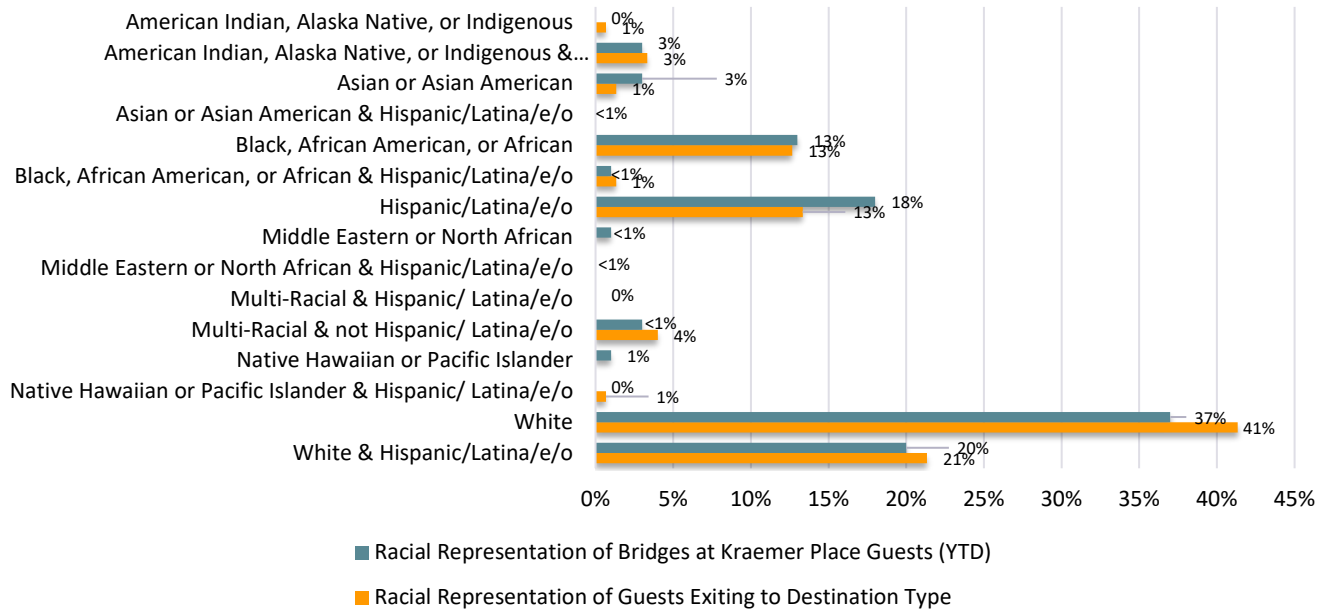

**Founded in 1984, PATH's mission is to end homelessness for individuals, families, and communities.**

For over 40 years, PATH has been a leader in innovative and effective strategies to end homelessness and support people transitioning from the streets to home. PATH does this by providing supportive services and building affordable and supportive housing across the state.

With staff in **150 cities** across California, PATH provides supportive services, including case management, street outreach, interim housing, housing navigation, employment assistance, mental health care resources, Veteran services, and substance use treatment linkages.

**In 2024, PATH connected over 28,000 Californians to a range of life-saving supportive services and helped over 5,300 people make it home.**

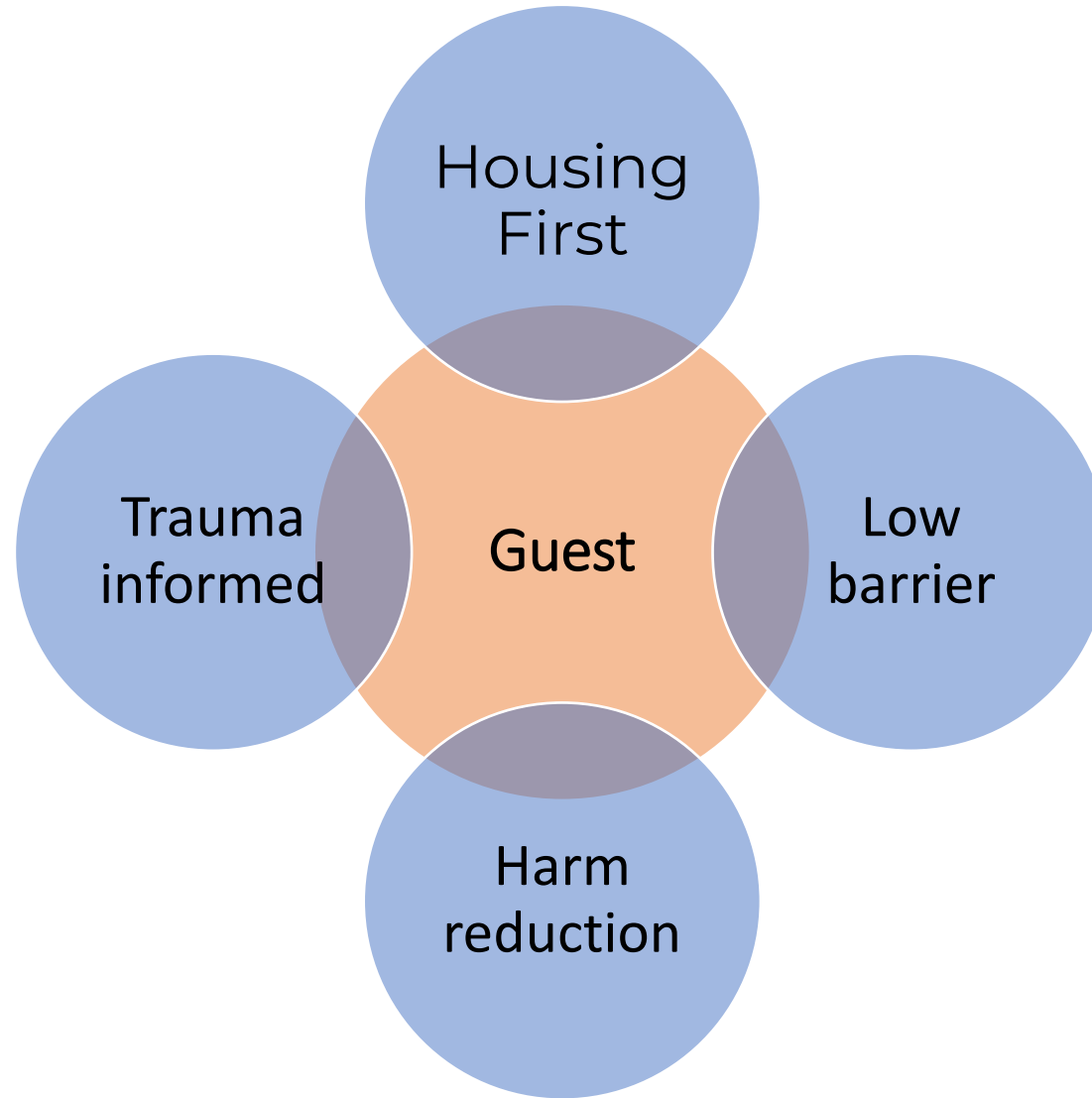
